FIRST SWEET POTATOES IN

GRAPES ENTER LOCAL MARKETS SELLING AT 10c PER POUND.

First Peach Plums of Season Bring Two and a Half Cents Per Lb.

This morning's market review shows that several new articles are now in season. Among the vegetables the sweet potato is an addition this morning. Sweet potatoes are bringing as their initial price 3 1/2c per pound.

This is the season for a variety of fresh fruits. Yesterday the famous Eagle Valley tomatoes were placed on the market. Today grapes have made their advent, selling at 10 cents a pound and peach plums are bringing an opening figure 2 1/2 cents. Pineapples are now quoted at 20c and 25c according to size.
