

TENNIS TOURNAMENT READY TO START

NAMES DRAWN FOR FIRST SET OF MATCHES TO BEGIN AT ONE.

Eighteen Players Enter Tournament, Arrangement of Play Settled.

Arrangements have now been completed and the entries matched and evingning of the La Grande tourney. Eighteen entries have been secured and many closely contested matches will result.

The contestants in the preliminaries will play as suits their convenience. The players shall furnish the balls which shall be new and in good condition or satisfactory to both players; that they shall secure someone as umpire for their match, satisfactory to both; that they shall pay a fee of 50 cents which shall be spent to buy suitable prizes for the winners, and to defray any incidental expense that is liable to occur. The official rules of the game shall be employed in all matches. There will be no handicaps nor consolation matches.

All matches in the first round shall be played by Wednesday night of next week, August 28th, and it is desirable that they be played as soon as possible. The court on the corner of Main and Fourth shall be used but in the first round if the contestants desire to use the hill court they may do so providing it is satisfactory to both contestants.

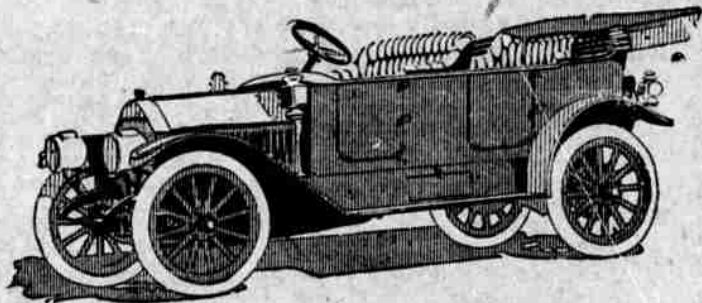
