mer, are selling at \$1 per dozen; butter, 65 cents per pound; spuds, 5 cents a pound, with other products in like proportion. Yet this land will raise anything that is grown in Idaho, Oregon or Montana. Most of the half-breeds and natives live on fish and the majority of them are too lazy to even cook the fish before eating. They place them in the sun for a few days and then have a feast. You may doubt this, but, nevertheless, it remains true.

This is the first year since the advent of the white man to this country that wells have been put down to sand where good water can be had. A well boring outfit reached this town about 30 days ago, and the owner has put down several wells that average about 45 feet in depth. He charges 50 cents per foot for dry holes and \$1.25 for wet ones, but water must be from sand or gravel. Before the advent of this fellow's coming, people contented themselves with surface water, which can be reached at from 10 to 20 feet, but the water from such wells has an amber color, while others has the color of green tea, the taste of the water varying considerable in such wells.

The whole of northern Alberta is a flat country and the same is true of the northeastern portion of British Columbia, where the Peace and Pine rivers flows, yet the upper waters of these rivers are in the mountains. As they continue their east and north course, they flow practically through a flat or rolling country, in many places covered with timber as before mentioned. A finer country for cattle and horses never existed. It is true, they should be fed at least four months of the year. The white settler feeds his stock, but the natives let them rustle. Very little snow falls in this section along the Peace river, 18 inches being the greatest record and in many places not enough for sleighing, and I have been in here nearly three years.

British Columbia is the country that I like. It is the Washington of Canada. Its rugged beauty can only be compared with portions of South

America, Central Peru, Bolivia and the Pacific side of Ecuador. The wonderful waterways, the glaciers, the cloud-kissed mountain peaks and rock-walled lakes are scenes that hang like a beautiful picture forever on memory's walls. When one parts from these scenic places, it is like leaving an old friend or a cherished relative that you long to meet again.

The entire coast and well back from the same is a wilderness of beauty. The Alps in Switzerland, when compared to this country, would look like 30 cents, twice spent. I dare not start a description or the letter would be too long for the mails. In my humble opinion, though, North and South America has Europe beat to a frazzle on scenes of any kind. It is true, Europe has a few old ruins, but nothing to compare with the Inca temples of Peru, Bolivia and Ecuador. As for the United States, visit the Grand canyon, the Hopi country and many places of Arizona, and one will be thoroughly convinced that the so-called old country is not the only thing with signs of old age.

For the present, adieu. I will leave in a few weeks for a trip to Edmonton; then back to the wilds for another surveying tour for the Edmonton, Dunvega & British Columbia railroad.
