The pendulum swung back again in the fifth when a hit, an error and a pass made the score 4 to 4. Three doubles, a couple of singles and a brace of errors doubled Pendleton's score in the last of the fourth and the best that La Grande could do thereafter was to put two more across in the eighth.
