MARKETS AS A WHOLE STEADY, TIMOTHY PRICE IS \$14.

Alfalfa Prices Fall Due to Large Yield and Damaged Quality.

The markets this morning are holding yesterday's prices in most lines. Timothy hay is quoted at \$14.00. Bran and shorts at \$1.30. Alfalfa hay has dropped one dollar from yesterday due to the harvesting of the second crop which is now flooding the market, and to the slightly damaged quality of most of the alfalfa caused by the recent rains. It is at present bringing \$12.00.
