Pendleton took one in the third and tied things in the fourth and followed up with one each in the fifth and sixth. La Grande earned another in the seventh and after that came the bunch that salted down the game.

Both Berger and Pugsley were hit hard but the fielding of the Buckaroos was of a higher order than that put up by the tailenders. The feature of the game was the hitting of Augustus. In four times at bat he secured the same number of safe ones, three them being two baggers.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 3rd day of April, 1912, creating improvement district No. 49, and designating First street as such district and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council on the 31st day of July, 1912, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that said portion of First street, in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by laying thereon a concrete storm sewer, the top being a walk, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made, that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of First street, from the south side of Adams avenue to the south side of Spring avenue.

(A) And the property affected or benefited by said improvement is as follows:

The east half of block 4, Grandy's second addition, and the east half of blocks 1 and 2, Romig's addition, all in the city of La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefited by said improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$788.97. That the council will, on the 4th day of September, 1912, meet at the council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock,

p. m., to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.

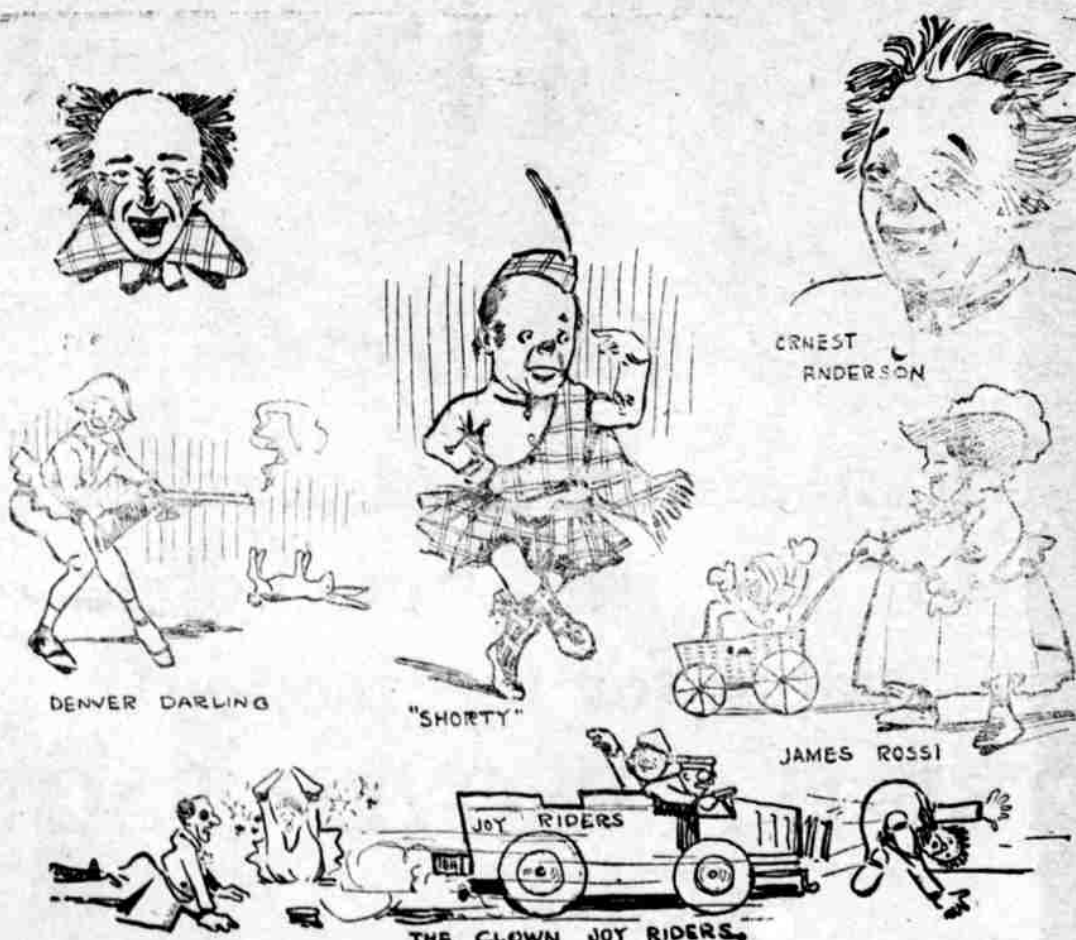
