DEATH CLAIMS VICTIM OF FALL

INJURIES THOUGHT ONLY SERIOUS ARE FATAL.

Well Known Rancher Killed in Run-away Accident Saturday Evening

F. A. Day died Saturday night from the results of injuries sustained in the accident that occurred on Jefferson street late Saturday afternoon. Mr. Day's legs were both fractured above the knees and his head was badly bruised, besides suffering from internal injuries. Mr. Day was of a quiet disposition and the suddenness of the accident and the shock of the injuries proved more than he could stand, for physician says the internal hurts were the primary cause of death.

F. A. Day was a prosperous farmer, living a few miles northeast of La Grande. But several days ago, he purchased a winter home in La Grande where his family could receive better school advantages. He was well known and highly thought of by many people in the county. His funeral was held from the Methodist church this afternoon, of which he has long been a faithful member.

Foster Arthur Day was born in Indiana Nov. 11, 1861, and passed from among men Aug. 24, 1912. He was married to Miss Martha E. McCall Dec. 3, 1892 and to them were born three daughters, all of whom with their mother survive him.

He became a Christian early in life and maintained his profession until his untimely end, a man a model of goodness among his fellowmen.

His funeral occurred from the Methodist church to which he and his family were attached and Dr. Gillilan conducted the services.

PACIFIC HIGHWAY MEETING

Attended by Promoters of Good Roads All Over Coast

The third annual convention of the Pacific Highway Association, which has as its primary object the laying out of a good trunk road along the Pacific coast, between the Canadian border and the Mexican line, and the eventual extension of the highway to the City of Mexico and on to Alaska, concluded a three day's session at the St. Francis hotel in San Francisco on August 7.

The convention which was largely attended, was marked by such good work and many able addresses of educational value on the subject of good roads, which are bound to result in great practical good to the cause espoused by the Association.

The complete program of the convention follows:

Gist of Work Accomplished.
Selected Vancouver, B. C. as the next meeting place.

Created position of executive officer at a salary of \$3000 annually.

Members pledged advance of \$6000 to carry on the work of the Association, to be repaid eventually out of the funds of the organization.

Adopted resolution, requesting Legislatures of Oregon and Washington to make adequate appropriations for the construction of Pacific highway through those states.

Requested Federal officials to open all National Parks to automobiles.

Invited Republic of Mexico to join in Pacific Highway movement and to construct an extension of the highway from the boundary of the United States to Mexico City.

Asked financial aid of Federal government in constructing bridges across the Columbia river near Portland and across the Colorado river, near Yuma, Ariz.

Exceeding Speed Limit Expensive.

All the records were smashed in the Municipal court at Portland, Oregon, in July in the collection of fines from persons who offended in various ways in driving automobiles and motorcycles. The grand total of money collected from this source is \$2535.

Of this sum, \$2025 was collected from 89 persons convicted of exceeding the speed limit with automobiles. Next in order came motorcycle riders 24 of whom paid fines into the city treasury to the amount of \$355.—Western Motor Record.

Auto Factories on Coast.

Two automobile manufacturing plants are to be established on the Pacific coast for the building of Little and Chevrolet cars, the latter a six-cylinder machine designed by the famous racing driver of that name. One factory is to be located in San Francisco and the other in the Northwest. The Republic Motor Company is the name of the firm that will establish the motor car building industry on the coast. The company, which is capitalized at \$65,000, is headed by W. C. Durant, who organized the General Motors Company which was recently sold to a syndicate of bankers.

Just what city in the Northwest will get the plant has not been announced. It is known that the firm has been negotiating for a site in Portland.—Western Motor Record.
