FRY SUPPLY IS AMPLIFIED LOCALLY

CONDITIONS EXISTING A FEW YEARS AGO GONE.

Local Fry Supply Section Have sufficient Chicken Supplies Now.

Increased attention to the poultry business has been seen in local markets this year. Contrary to past experiences, the meat market does not have to send else-

where for the frozen supplies as they are available in the immediate vicinity to meet all demands. Only choice spring fry material is showing up in the market this summer as the dealers can make their selections to suit the market and do not have to grab whatever is offered. A few years ago the chicken industry was sadly neglected in Union county but every near-town resident and scores of those in the town are these days raising chickens for themselves and some to sell.

The market quotations today are:

New home grown apples—75c per box. Oranges 40c to 50c. Bananas—40c per doz. Peaches—10c; homegrown 4 lbs. for 25c.

Cherries—25c gallon. Cantaloupes—10c each; 3 for 25c. Watermelons—2c lb. Tomatoes—10c lb. Eagle valley \$1.10 box.

Peach plums—2c lb. Pears—2 1/2c lb. Grapes—10c lb. Pineapple—20c and 25c, size.

Vegetables and Miscellaneous. Cucumbers—5 to 10c. Onions—\$2.00 per cwt. String beans—4 lbs. for 25c. Green peas—5 lbs. for 25c. Potatoes—\$1.50 per cwt. Green onions—5c bunch, 2 for 10c. Beans—White, 8 1-3c; Lima, 10 cents. New Cabbage—2 1/2c. Celery—Per bunch, 15c.
