The convention was marked by much business of importance to the lodge and the remarkable increase in numbers was always a conspicuous phase of reports from all sections. The La Grande lodge of some 500 has been added since the last supreme lodge.

BORDEN IS SCORED.

Suffrage Leaders in London Say He Dodges the Issues at Stake.

London, Aug. 28.—Because he refused to promise to introduce legislation for woman suffrage in the Canadian parliament, London militant suffragettes were bitter in their denunciation here tonight for Robert L. Borden, premier of Canada. On his leaving they declared he "dodged the issue."

"So far as Canada is concerned," said Borden here tonight, "the question of giving the ballot to women is one for the provincial legislatures to decide. Anyway, the Canadian women are best able to decide for themselves what they want."

"The Women's Social Political union is reported to be considering a militant campaign in Canada and may undertake to keep prospective immigrants away from Canada, sending them to New Zealand and Australia instead."

TENNIS MATCHES DELAYED.

Circus and Rain Prevent the Tennis Matches to Be Played Yesterday.

The schedule of the La Grande tennis journey was sadly upset yesterday on account of the lateness of the circus and the showers last evening and this morning. Several matches of the first round still remain to be played and these will be arranged as soon as possible in order that the second preliminaries may be started.

New Orleans to Vote on Commission.

New Orleans, La., Aug. 27.—Supporters and opponents of the proposed adoption of the commission plan of government for the city of New Orleans closed their campaign today. The question will be decided at a special election tomorrow. The measure to be voted upon provides for the administration of city affairs by five commissioners, one the mayor, all elective, a state measure, the referendum and the recall features are cared for in inkblot features being subject to a petition of 30 per cent of the registered voters.

Farmers' Warehouse Movement.

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 27.—Plans for handling the cotton crop and a movement looking to the consummation of the National Warehouse and Elevator company were discussed at a mass convention of the Georgia Farmers' union in this city today. The warehouse project which already has taken definite shape in a number of states, is regarded as the most advanced step yet taken by the farmers of the country in the line of co-operation for mutual benefit and protection.

Draft the Kansas Platform.

Topeka, Kas., Aug. 27.—In accordance with the provisions of the new Kansas primary law the "councils" of the several political parties assembled in Topeka today. The party councils are made up of the congressmen, the members of the state legislature, electors and county chairmen. The principal business of the party council is to prepare the state platform. State chairmen also are to be selected and arrangements completed for the coming state campaign.

Chicago to Have Pure Milk.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 27.—The pasteurization of all of Chicago's milk supply that comes from dairies not approved by the health commissioner is required by a new city ordinance that came into force today. Physicians and health experts are of the opinion that a strict enforcement of the ordinance will result in a material decrease of infant mortality.

The business of the convention will be disposed of tomorrow and the two days following will be devoted to the prize competitions and races which are the leading features of the annual tournament.

Wing Family Reunion.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 27.—Several hundred of the 100,000 lineal descendants of the widow, Deborah Wing, and her four sons, who first settled in Saugus, Mass., in 1632, gathered at the auditorium in this city today for the eighth annual reunion of the Wing Family, Incorporated. The family association was incorporated in Massachusetts 20 years ago and numbers thousands of members throughout the country. The present reunion is the first that the association has held in the west.
