STATE BOOK REACHES CITY

REGULAR ELECTION PAMPHLET IS EXHAUSTIVE.

All Measures With Arguments Pro and Con, Included Between Covers.

All measures referred to the people by the legislative assembly, referendum ordered by petition of the people and proposed by initiative petition that are to be submitted to the legal voters of the state of Oregon for approval or rejection at the regular general election to be held November 5, have reached La Grande in pamphlet form. There are 256 pages in the pamphlet and not only deals with the proposed laws but carries arguments for and against the several measures.

It is properly indexed so that any measure can be quickly located and appended arguments found without difficulty.

The measures total nearly 40, but the arguments pro and con go into the subjects extensively so that the book is a library on the up to the moment subjects. The law to prohibit boycotting and picketing, capital punishment, the convict labor question, freight rate regulation, creating a highway department, inheritance tax, the blue sky law, protecting sub contractors, providing a new manner of taxation for the state's schools, and several measures dealing with the road and tax question make up these "proposed by initiative petition. Amendments to existing laws are brought forth in the bill to put the state printer on a flat salary and exempting household goods from taxation.

The amendments to the constitution that are proposed number a score or so, while the referendum petitions proposed have a good number.

UMPS GOLDEN FACES CHARGE

JESS GARRETT ACCUSES HIM OF BRIBERY.

Charges of Drunkenness and Bribery Preferred Against Arbitrator.

Pendleton, Ore., Aug. 29.—(Special)

—A crisis has been reached in the league and sensational developments affairs of the Western Tri-State are promised before the week is over. Manager Jesse T. Garrett of the Pendleton team, has filed serious charges against Umpire Golden and President Sweet has called a meeting of the directors of the league to take action against Golden or against Garrett if he fails to prove the charges. Secretary Keefe was instructed to call the meeting for September 3 at Boise in a telegraphic message from Sweet this afternoon.

Golden include drunkenness, incompetency and offering to accept bribe money. In a message to the East Oregonian this afternoon, he stated that he had not only filed the charges but had produced the proof to substantiate them. The Pendleton manager alleges that Golden was drunk several times while officiating here during the Pendleton-Walla Walla series, that he remitted fines levied against Pendleton players contrary to the constitution and that he offered to give decisions in one of the games here which would affect the result and for

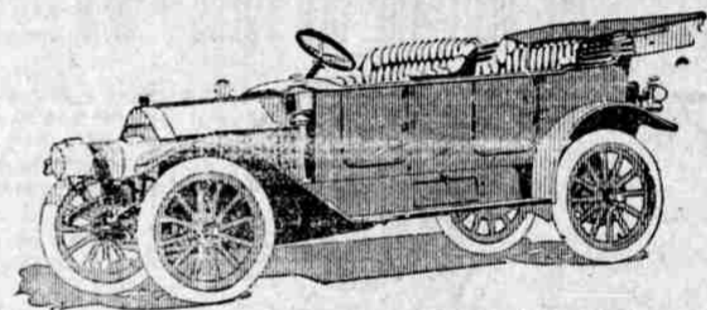
which he was to receive a stipulated sum. Every fan who has seen him work here will testify to his incompetency and many local people will give evidence to the effect that he was drinking heavily while here.

Before leaving for Boise, Garrett and the officers of the local club requested President Sweet to use Umpire Starkell in the final series which would decide the second place honors. President Bossner of the Boise club and Manager Gimlin refused to consent to this arrangement and held

out for Golden. The result was that Golden was retained.

According to Garrett's statements, he was "rotten" in the opening game, giving all of the close decisions to Boise. Yesterday in the third inning with the score 2 to 2, Garrett disputed one of Golden's decisions, was ordered off the grounds, and, upon his refusal to go, forfeited the game to Boise by a nine to nothing score.
