

LITTLE WHEAT PUT ON MARKET

THRESHERMEN BUSY AND THE GRANARIES FILL.

Little Attention Given to Sales of 1912 Wheat in Grande Ronde.

Up until this afternoon threshermen of Union county have had a very successful week, and granaries have been filling rapidly. But while the splendid crop of wheat is being threshed, there is but little movement in the sale line. What few deals have been closed bring an average of 67 or 68 cents but not enough has been sold to date to be indicative of what the prices locally will really be.

Invariably threshing reports bring in fine returns. The grain is of a good variety and with the prices likely to be between 65 and 70 cents the wheat raisers face a profitable fall. Today's rain has had a tendency of halting the threshing yet there seems little question but that the work will proceed more or less regularly until the crop is harvested.

SUNDAY CLOSING RULES FIXED

POSTMASTER EXPLAINS WORKING ORDERS.

Special Delivery Letters and Various Others to Go on Sunday.

ORDERS FROM POSTOFFICE DEPARTMENT.
 Orders of the 24th inst., as follows: Hereafter all postoffices of first and second classes shall not open on Sundays for the purpose of delivering mail to the general public, but this provision shall not prevent the prompt delivery of special delivery mail.

In regard to the above order, more fully elaborated upon yesterday, Postmaster G. M. Richey today issued a statement covering conditions as they will exist here. The statement says:

In accordance with above orders, mails arriving upon trains 18 and 9 Saturday night will be worked as before, when on time; if late, the mail will be held together with mails arriving upon Sunday, and the letters worked out and distributed to boxes Sunday evening, between the hours of 6 and 10. Letters for persons in care of hotels, will be worked out upon trains, and delivered promptly to the hotel boxes. Specials will be delivered upon arrival, papers and periodicals can be had by the news dealers by calling for same.

This change will reduce the work, so as to enable clerks and carriers to realize the day for rest and recreation. Barring the delay of about ten hours in working out Sunday mails, the service locally will be about the same as before. After the patrons become accustomed to the change, there will probably be very little inconvenience resulting thereby. All outgoing mails will be dispatched as before.

LA GRANDERS SCARE BEARS BUT THAT IS ALL.

Fitchner Opens Game but Is Benched for Insubordination.

Then the Bears got busy and refused to allow any more. La Grande had already annexed two in the fourth and the three began to loom up big.

Walla Walla got her runs in the first when Davis and two more crossed over. Another was secured in the second, one in the fourth and one in the seventh.

Features of the game were Thompson's one hand catch of a hot liner that looked good for one base and Martini's long run and catch near the left foul line.
