

HAYWOOD AND I. W. W. PLAN PROTEST STRIKE

MORRISON IMMEDIATELY NIPS HAYWOOD PLAN IN BUD

PROTEST AGAINST LAWRENCE EPISODE OVER MILL STRIKE

Ettore and Giovannitti Held in Jail Unjustly and William Haywood Would Lead Universal Strike on September 30—Said All Industrial Workers Will Go on Strike Then

New York, Sept. 6.—Announcement that all members of the Industrial Workers of the World would strike September 30th in protest against the imprisonment of Joseph Ettore and Alturo Giovannitti at Lawrence, Mass., was made here today by William D. Haywood, a leader of the organization. Haywood alleges that Ettore and Giovannitti are held in jail unjustly, being charged with the murder of a woman killed during the Lawrence strike.

Haywood has just returned from Providence, R. I., where he attended a meeting of the Ettore-Giovannitti defense committee. "The strike," said Haywood, "we propose to call will be complete. The labor world is wrought up by the imprisonment of these men, and it is even causing agitation abroad. We mean business."

Haywood said he had assurance that the steel workers would walk out with the other strikers.

Morrison Repudiates Haywood. Washington, Sept. 6.—The American Federation of Labor will not join the movement for a general strike urged by officials of the Industrial Workers of the World, in protest against the imprisonment of Joseph Ettore and Alturo Giovannitti, leaders in the Lawrence textile strike. The attitude of the big body is expressed in unmistakable terms by Secretary Frank Morrison.

"Organized labor," said Morrison, "will not quit work in response to any call from William D. Haywood. I am quite sure no member of the American Federation or any of its affiliated organizations, would seriously consider Haywood's suggestion. Labor as typified by the federation is not following the leadership of Haywood and others of his ilk."

COUPE TELLS EVIDENCE.

Writes From England Regarding His Knowledge of Rosenthal Crime.

Preston, Eng., Sept. 6.—Thomas Coupe, a former clerk at the Elks club in New York today admitted he had sent a sworn statement to District Attorney Whitman of New York of all he knows concerning the Rosenthal murder. The statement is said to contain damaging evidence against Police Lieutenant Becker charged with the Rosenthal murder.

In the deposition Coupe said he saw the men he assumes were the murderers getting into an automobile. He declared he saw Rosenthal fall, and saw the men drive away from the scene. Coupe also swore that a night watchman told him he saw Becker crossing 43rd street at 4 o'clock the morning following the murder.

To Watch Mexican Situation.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 6.—The cruiser Des Moines, in command of Commander Charles B. Hughes, sailed from the Charlestown navy yard today for a cruise along the east coast of Mexico, for the protection of American interests there if necessary. The vessel will stop at Vera Cruz, Tampico, Progreso and other points.

CHICAGO AGAPE OVER FIGHT AGAINST VICE AND MURDERS

Miss Brooks Has Received Official Attention From Officers--'Death Flask' Woman Wanted

Chicago, Sept. 6.—A campaign started by Miss Virginia Brooks against disorderly resorts in West Hammond, a Chicago suburb, has received official recognition for the first time today when Coroner Hoffman, State Attorney Wayman and Assistant Police Chief Schuttler confirmed with her to lay a plan for unravelling the mysterious death of John Messmaker. Miss Brooks asserts that Messmaker is one of the many victims of knockout drops administered at West Hammond resorts.

Deathflash Frankie Sought.

Efforts of the investigators today focussed on Frankie Ford, a woman said to have been with Messmaker at the time of his death. The officers have also searched a saloon for the "death flash" the Ford woman is said to have mentioned in a letter of confession. Miss Brooks maintains that poison contained in this bottle killed Messmaker as well as several others.

Four detectives were today assigned to guard Miss Brooks, she having been threatened with death unless the probe stopped.

Others Besides Woman Wanted.

A warrant charging Mrs. Ethel Parker, alias Frankie Ford, with the murder of Messmaker was sworn to by Miss Brooks this afternoon. The Ford woman is alleged to have been brought to resorts in West Hammond in defiance of the white slave law. Other warrants are expected before night.

Police Scooped at Murders.

All Chicago is aroused over the West Hammond situation. Scathing denunciation of the Chicago police is voiced here this afternoon by Miss Brooks. She says that more than 20 girls and men have died from knockout drops administered in West Hammond resorts but that the police scooped at her charges when she produced what she termed material evidence.

Some of Chicago's most prominent women are backing Miss Brooks in her crusade against social evils.

WEST DRIVES 3 SALOONS OUT

OREGON ELECTRIC DEPOT TO BE RIDD

Weinhardt's Brewery Notified—Hints at Troops If Needed.

Portland, Ore., Sept. 6.—Governor West today wrote letters to Dan Capach, W. H. Meyer, and E. Frickhorn, proprietors of three saloons in the Oregon Electric depot here, notifying them to cease operation on the ground that they were public nuisances. He wrote a letter to Weinhardt's brewery notifying them not to serve these places.

West has instructed Attorney Esterley to proceed against the saloons. He probably will sue on injunctions. West said he would use "more drastic means" to close the saloons if ordinary methods don't work. It is supposed by that he meant the militia. He said he would issue an official proclamation against the three saloons in a few hours.

DAKOTANS HEAR COLONEL.

La Follette's Name Not Mentioned but Is Involved in Hints.

Fargo, N. D., Sept. 6.—"Any man claiming to be a Progressive who does not support the Progressive party is merely a tool," said Roosevelt speaking here today. He did not mention La Follette but his hearers understood his remark to apply to the Wisconsin senator.

"The people must be for us or against us," said the ex-president. "Loyalty to the Progressive principles can be shown only by supporting the party."

Festival to Exploit Vintages.

St. Helena, Cal., Sept. 6.—With the coronation of a carnival queen St. Helena today ushered in a four days' vintage festival intended to exploit the viticultural and horticultural resources and industries of this section of California. The festival includes elaborate exhibits of grapes, wine, grape juice, wine making machinery and decorative features suggestive of vineyards and wineries.

STRAUSS NAMED FOR GOVERNOR

PROGRESSIVES PICK THE MILLIONAIRE MERCHANT.

Woodruff's Man Is Withdrawn Following Quick Stamped.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 6.—Oscar S. Strauss, the New York millionaire merchant, was this afternoon nominated for governor of New York by the Progressive convention here. The delegates stamped to Strauss as a compromise candidate just when the vote was about to be taken. Timothy Woodruff withdrew the name of Wm. R. Prendergast and Strauss' nomination was made unanimous. The state chairman, Wm. Hotchkiss, had also been placed in nomination despite his personal objection.

Mayflower Folks at Work.

Plymouth, Mass., Sept. 6.—The sixth triennial congress of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants is now in progress in this town. The society includes local branches in Massachusetts, New York, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Illinois, New Jersey, Ohio, Wisconsin, Rhode Island, Colorado, Michigan, Minnesota and California. The society held two business sessions today, with a luncheon in the First Church. Tomorrow the delegates will go to Clark's Island, where the Pilgrims worshipped the first day after they landed at Plymouth. The Cape Cod canal and other places of interest will be visited also.

Third Party Active in Washington.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 6.—Washington's claim to being the banner Roosevelt state of the Northwest will be put to a numerical test tomorrow, when state wide primaries will be conducted by the new Progressive party. Candidates will be selected at the primaries for state, congressional and county officers. Four aspirants are contesting for the nomination for governor. Candidates receiving the highest vote in the primaries will be nominated by the state convention, which has been called to meet in this city next Tuesday.

PAT HAMILTON AND 2 OTHERS FALL TO DEATH

NAVIGATION OF AIR CLAIMS ITS TOLLS TODAY

ENGLISH OFFICERS KILLED IN ONE MACHINE

German Falls to His Death in Manner Exactly Similar to That Causing Death of the Englishmen—Disturbances in Air Upset Machine and All Fall to Instant Death.

London, Sept. 6.—While flying in a monoplane near Gravelly today Captain Patrick Hamilton and Lieut. A. W. Stuart, fell 1,000 feet, and were instantly killed when the machine split in two.

Both Hamilton and Stuart were members of the royal army corps. The two army officers were participating in maneuvers and were descending when they encountered a gale. The monoplane was violently buffeted and finally snapped in half. The bodies were mangled beyond recognition.

Death at Munich.

Munich, Sept. 6.—Participating in army maneuvers, Lieutenant Steger was instantly killed when the biplane he was operating was caught in a storm and plunged 300 feet to the earth.

INQUEST IS HELD.

Mexican Met Death Accidentally, Finds Coroner's Jury.

That Juan Lopez met his death accidentally yesterday morning without cause from anyone's negligence was the finding of a coroner's jury called by County Coroner Bacon this morning. It was believed the victim of the fatal accident had been drinking and stumbled between the moving cars in the coal chutes.

Dr. Maxwell's Anniversary.

New York, Sept. 6.—The many friends of Dr. William H. Maxwell joined today in a suitable observance of the 25th anniversary of his appointment as superintendent of schools in New York. Dr. Maxwell was born in Ireland 60 years ago and came to the United States in 1874. In 1887 he became superintendent of schools in Brooklyn and since 1898 he has held the position of superintendent of all the public schools of Greater New York.

CONVICTS ARE FLOGGED 'TILL BLOOD SPURTS

LEADERS IN MICHIGAN PRISON RIOT SUFFER PUNISHMENT

EX-CONVICTS MUTTER BITTER DISAPPROVAL

Fifteen Are Flogged Today by Prison Guards Until Blood Spurts—Three Fainted Yesterday as Result of Loss of Blood—All Leaders to Be Punished Likewise for Leading Riot.

Jackson, Mich., Sept. 6.—"Lash them until the blood spurts," is the order being carried out today by the prison guards here against convicts who figured in the recent revolt here.

The rebellion of prisoners is over but punishment of the ringleaders is still in progress. Fifteen convicts were flogged today. Nine were whipped yesterday, three fainting from loss of blood.

The punishment will go on until all the men participating in the uprising are punished.

Police reports this afternoon are that former convicts are gathering in groups on the streets here discussing the whipping of the prisoners who participated in a demonstration at the state prison against the food served. A hundred ex-convicts are here and it is feared some of them are planning an attack on the prison.

AUTO REVERSES SELF ON STREET

MEMBER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT CUTS QUEER CAPER.

Striking Wet Pavement, Machine Swooses Completely Around.

P. A. Foley and his automobile created as much excitement as a near-fire this morning when he was on the way to a fine blaze in the Zubar apartment, corner Seventh and Pennsylvania. He was cutting the corner with his machine when he struck wet pavement. Quick as a flash the machine swerved and kept it going until it had turned end for end and was facing the reverse direction from which he intended to go. That the trick couldn't be turned without accident again in a hundred years, was the opinion of those who saw the lightning like caper of the machine.

The incident required but a momentary halt in his progress.

The fire was more or less a false alarm. A burning flag had been left opened in the basement and for a few minutes the fire menaced the building but quickly died out.

ASTER SHOW UNCERTAIN.

Shortage of Blooms May Require the Cancellation of Show.

Unless sufficient entries have been made by Sunday with Mrs. A. B. Cherry or Mrs. M. K. Hall the annual aster show will be canceled. The weather has been very unfavorable to perfected blooms and there has scarcely been a single entry thus far. If the aster growers find that they blossoms do not warrant a show, they should notify the committee or if willing to enter, should do so anyway. Immediate action is necessary and required.

NEGRO AIM TO AVE DEED OF YESTERDAY

PRINCETON, W. VA. IS SEETHING WITH BAD FEELING

NEGROES ORDERED OFF THE STREETS BY WHITES

Four or Five Hundred Who Participated in Lynching Are Defiant Today and Have Warned Negroes to Keep Away From Town—Blacks Want Retribution.

Bluefield, W. Va., Sept. 6.—Bloody retribution for the lynching by white men yesterday of Walter Johnson, a negro for attempted assault on Nita White, a 14-year-old white girl, is threatened today by negroes of Princeton according to telephone messages received here today.

The blacks, though keeping under cover, are sullen, defiant and bitter and a race riot is expected momentarily. Five hundred mountaineers who participated in the lynching, are prepared for trouble. They have warned all negroes in Princeton to keep off the streets.

ARKANSAS VOTES TODAY.

Governorship Forfeited but the Amendments Are Many.

Little Rock, Ark., Sept. 6.—Arkansas voters will go to the polls next Monday to select a complete set of state and county officers and vote for or against the adoption of a number of proposed amendments to the state constitution. As a victory for the Democratic ticket headed by Congressman Joe T. Robinson as the candidate for governor is a foregone conclusion, all interest in the election is confined practically to the vote on the proposed amendments, several of which are of a highly important character.

The election will afford the first practical test of the initiative and referendum in Arkansas, which places responsibilities upon the voters heretofore delegated exclusively to the legislature. Chief among the measures to be submitted is the act providing for state wide prohibition and the act providing an almost new revenue law for the state, commonly known as the Turner-Jacobson bill.

The proposed act providing for state wide prohibition prohibits the manufacture, sale or giving away in the state of Arkansas alcohol, or any spirituous, ardent, malt, vinous or fermented liquors, or any compound or preparation thereof commonly called tonic bitters or medicinal liquors. The penalty for the first offense is a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500 and for the second or any subsequent offense the fine is not less than \$100 nor more than \$1000 and imprisonment in jail not less than three months nor more than twelve months. Each sale or gift shall be constituted a separate offense.

The third of the proposed amendments, and the one in which probably more interest is being manifested than in any of the others, is that providing for the recall. All state and county officers, including the judges, are affected by the proposed amendment. The amendment is probably the most drastic of its kind that has been proposed in any of the states and it is the general belief that it will be rejected at the polls. The opposition to the measure is based largely upon the provision that only 15 per cent of the voters is necessary to initiate the recall of any official.
