36 Years of Solitary Confinement.
Boston, Mass., Sept. 6.—Jesse Pom-
eroy, probably the most notorious of
life prisoners in the United States, to-
day rounded out his 36th year of soli-
tary confinement in the state prison at
Charlestown. At the age of 16 he was
sent to prison for torturing and mur-
dering little children. While "solitary
imprisonment" is the name given to
the punishment Pomeroy is undergo-
ing, it does not mean that he never
leaves his cell. Each day, while the
other prisoners are at work, he is
permitted to walk in a small yard
where no eye except that of the guard
can see him. During his many years
behind the bars Pomeroy has educat-
ed himself from the books in the pris-
on's large library.

The International Convention of Op-
erative Plasterers will meet in Mil-
waukee on September 30th.

During the six months ending June
30 the Brotherhood of Painters and
Decorators organized 48 new local
unions, the organization now having
944 local unions in good standing.

In Berlin several offices have been
opened where women workers may
lodge complaints as to the sanitary
condition of the buildings in which
they work, without necessarily giving
their own names.
