Management Out After Exhibits for Fair Week in Force.

"Go to fair grounds early," is the word of advice from President A. L. Richardson and his colleagues in the county fair. The fair needs exhibits—there is room for untold quantities and varieties and every spare moment in the ranks of the managers is being given over to urging farmers and orchardists to make a desirable showing next week.

SINGLE TAX TO BE DISCUSSED

CHARLES H. SHIELDS TO ATTACK SYSTEM.

Forerunner of the Principal Speaker, a Portland Man, Here Today.

Blazing the way for Charles H. Shields, secretary of the Oregon Equal Taxation league, T. S. Alexander, a well known business man of Portland arrived here today.

Mr. Alexander came from Portland to make arrangements for a speaking tour in Eastern Oregon for Mr. Shields who is expected to hold a meeting here Sept. 18th when he will address the voters of La Grande on "Single Tax Exposed."

"I represent," said Mr. Alexander, "an organization of at least 20,000 farmers and other business men of the state of Oregon. These men have aligned themselves together to combat what we believe a political scheme being put forward by a millionaire, Joseph Fels, known as single tax."

Mr. Alexander went on to say in his opinion that the ultimate end of single tax, and graduated single tax, as the measure is known in Oregon, was bound to be confiscation of the land.

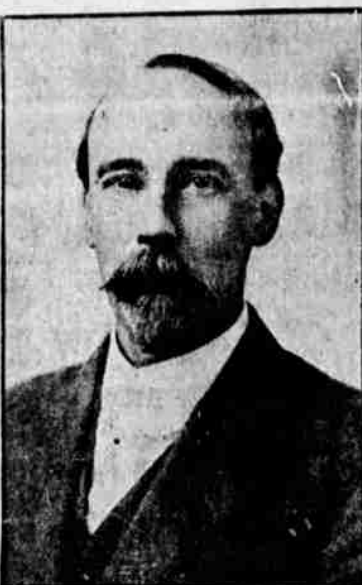

EXTRA ROOMS MUCH WANTED

FOLEY HOTEL TO COMPILE ROOM LIST.

Townpeople Asked to Throw Open Homes and List Themselves.

With assistance from the townspeople—which is hereby solicited—La Grande will be able to accommodate any sized crowd that may camp in La Grande over night during fair week.

It is expected that the city's hostellers will be taxed on Thursday night especially but in the event that the capacity of the hotels is taxed and overburdened on any night, a plan has been set afoot which will remedy these conditions at all times. All those who have rooms that can be rented for a night or two nights, have but to notify the Foley hotel and the rooms will be carefully compiled and listed. The plan is that the rooms shall bring a maximum price of \$1.00 for a single bed and \$1.50 for a double bed. These prices are set that the strangers within the gates be not "held up" for accommodations. These rooms should be listed at once. Then, when complete, P. A. Foley, the manager, will send his "fronts" out with the guests to the residences. If all the hotels in the city are full. The understanding is that the residences are to be called upon only in the last recourse, but it is easily believable that there will be several times during that week rooms in the residence section will be needed. Co-operation from the townspeople is urgently requested.
