EUGENICS, BEAUTY AND LUCKY BABY SHOW CARRIES THREE BEAUTIFUL PRIZES

FIVE DOCTORS REQUIRED TO SCIENTIFICALLY MEASURE BABES

Babes are being entered hourly for the annual baby show to be held at the fair commencing at 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Selection of beautiful prizes, naming of judges and announcement of other details have been made by Mrs. A. L. Richardson today, and added names with those published yesterday, are given below. More are entered hourly.

It is essential that the babes be at the grounds at 1 o'clock sharp. But one hour has been set aside for the baby show and the races start at 2 on Tuesday on this account. Five or six doctors will carry out the eugenics test, and each physician will be able to handle one child's measurements in five minutes, making it possible for the group to test 60 children in one hour. The totals for this department cannot be struck until later as it will be a big task to add up all the fractions in computing the score for each babe. The other winners can, of course, be announced on the grounds. It is also probable that arrangements will be made to return each score card after it has been filled out to the parents so they can determine the child's "rating" as judged by a physician on the basis of a national basis of perfection.

The Prizes Offered.
The winner of the eugenics test will be awarded a beautiful diamond ring. This piece of jewelry will be worth considerable money and the honor attending the strong baby will be worth mentioning too, so that the babe that by virtue of its physical development wins the ring will have double honors bestowed upon it.

The winner of the beauty prize is to get a solid silver cup, gold lined. This prize is a beauty and all children

dren entered for the other two departments are automatically entered for the beauty prize.

The lucky baby, drawing numbers, obtains a solid silver baby set, consisting of a knife, fork and spoon.

The tests to be made.

The tests that are to be applied have been reduced slightly from the standard table of tests but the following tests will be given, with the perfect score indicated:

Weight 10, height 10, circumference of chest 10, symmetry 5, skin and fat 5, walking 10, head-length, width and circumference—15, face 25, teeth 10, possible 100.

The judges for the eugenics test will be Drs. Laughlin, Bacon, Hall Holt and Molitor.
