fraudulent contests which he and his lieutenants later admitted had no merit. Not only did they admit that the contests had no merit but even during the hearing of the contests before the Republican national committee, they were forced to concede that they had made these contests only for effect, to deceive the public into believing that President Taft's delegate strength was less than it really was.

"And now this same Roosevelt, fresh from the exposure of the confessed fraud and dishonesty of the claims put forward in his interest, and with his knowledge that 164 or more of his contests of delegate seats were fraudulent charges the Republican national committee, with stealing for Mr. Taft's benefit. Is a man who comes before the people with such unclean hands to be believed on his mere charge against the man who succeeded where he had failed?"

"Mr. Roosevelt has also told you of his so-called Progressive party. As I understand his program he purposes to appoint 'my commission' to say which trust is a good trust and which trust is a bad trust; to say which trust shall be fostered and encouraged and licensed to gobble up its competitors, as he licensed the steel trust to absorb its chief rival and only dangerous competitor, the Tennessee Coal and Iron company.

"What a fine chairman for that commission, Mr. Perkins will make.

"If you are elected, Mr. Roosevelt, do you intend to dismiss the suit brought against the Harvester trust, by the Taft administration?"

"Do you intend to dismiss the suit brought against the steel trust?"

"Bear in mind that Mr. Roosevelt's ambition to become a third term candidate for the presidency of the United States did not crystallize into visible form until President Taft's administration had presumed to go into court and to ask for a dissolution of Mr. Roosevelt's special favorite, the steel trust.

"Mr. Roosevelt is publicly congratulating himself that in cutting loose from the Republican party he has separated himself completely from the bosses and that he is proud of his new bedfellows, as he puts it. Who is the chief of these bedfellows of whom Mr. Roosevelt is so proud? The notorious Bill Flinn of Pittsburg."

Mr. Bede brought his attack on Roosevelt to the following climax, after asking when the colonel had become dissatisfied with the Republican party:

"Mr. Roosevelt is a disappointed office seeker, lying about his successful opponent, maligning the party that has so signally honored him and blackguarding and disgracing the highest office in the land.

"He tried to steal a presidential nomination; failing, he is now bent on defeating those who foiled him in that attempt and on destroying the party whose history in war and peace for more than fifty years reads like a golden fairy story in the annals of the nation."
