

## TROOPS CALLED ON IN A LAST RESORT--SPRY

### MINE DISTURBANCE IN UTAH UNMARKED BY SHOOTING

#### SHERIFF GIVEN RESPONSIBILITY OF MAINTAINING PEACE

Fearing Troops Would Spool Trouble, Governor Decides Not to Call Them Upon the Striking Bingham Grounds Until It Is Absolutely Necessary—Saloons Are Closed at Bingham Today.

Salt Lake, Utah, Sept. 21.—Governor Spry today conferred with Adjutant General Edgewood and Sheriff Sharp and the mine officials and decided not to call out the troops except as a last resort. It is feared their presence would make trouble. Twenty-five strikebreakers have been taken secretly into Bingham. Saloons are closed there.

Sheriff Sharp was given the responsibility of preserving peace. Besides 300 deputies at Bingham he has 15 men at Barney, six miles from Bingham to preserve order there. This morning the sheriff's deputies entered the workings of the mines without molestation from the workers' pickets who are entrenched on the mountainside. Later they prepared, evidently to keep their promise to Governor Spry that they would not start shooting.

#### SNEED HAD ACCOMPLICE.

### Wholesale Murder Abetted by Farm Hand on Sneed's Ranch

Amarillo, Tex., Sept. 21.—B. B. Epping 36 years old, employed on the ranch of J. B. Sneed was arrested here after admissions that he assisted in Sneed's plans to kill Al. G. Royce, Jr., and his father as a result of Royce's attempts to induce Mrs. Sneed to elope. Epping made the statement in a written communication to the district attorney. The grand jury has reconvened to discuss Epping's confession.

#### Jem Driscoll Coming.

London, Sept. 21.—Jem Driscoll, the British featherweight champion, sailed for New York today to begin another fight campaign in America. He hopes to secure a match with Champion Johnny Kilbane, but is somewhat doubtful whether the Cleveland boy will reduce in weight to 126 pounds. In the meantime Driscoll will take on 'Knockout' Brown, Young Jack O'Brien and several others with whom agreements have already been signed.

## WILSON'S TOUR COMES TO END

### CANDIDATE RETURNS TIRED BUT HAPPY.

#### Estimates He Has Met Over Two Million People En Tour.

Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 21.—Woodrow Wilson, the Democratic presidential nominee, left here en route to Sea Girt, N. J. to pass Sunday with his family. Before leaving Harrisburg Wilson said: "It is difficult for me to view my trip objectively. The most interesting thing to me is the people's friendliness—they seemed so cordial. The plainest fellows are most cordial. They seem to feel I am accessible and the trip was quite successful. I am tired but nevertheless enjoyed talking to and meeting the crowds."

Wilson estimated that he addressed and has been given receptions by 85,000 people.

## Scout War Against Fly

### "SWAT THE FLY" IS THEIR BATTLE CRY.

#### COUNT TO BE KEPT

#### Well-Organized Campaign Against the Flies Started by Scouts.

"Swat the fly" is the battle cry of the Boy Scouts of La Grande. At their general meeting last night the Scouts unanimously decided to start a war against the flies of this city. The fall campaign will open at 9:00 a. m. Monday, Sept. 23rd. This means 23 for any fly that comes within reach of a Scout. This morning a committee representing all three troops met and drew up the following temporary rules to govern the fight for this fall:

1. Report each day before 9:00 a. m. to Y. M. C. A. by phone or in person, your killing for the previous day.
2. Only individual records will be kept.
3. There are to be no restrictions as to how to kill the flies.
4. All flies must be burned as soon as they are counted.
5. Any Scout may have as many of his friends, not now Scouts working under his direction as he desires.
6. No Scout will trespass on any territory already secured by any other Scout without permission from that Scout.

The campaign will not close with this fall. During the winter the Scouts will make a study of flies, where they breed, how dangerous they are and how to get rid of them. Every citizen of La Grande should back up the boys in this fight.

The fight is on. Scouts, do your best.

## COMING WEEK REPLETE WITH BIG ELECTIONS

### NEW YORK REPUBLICANS TO GATHER DURING NEXT WEEK

#### NEW JERSEY, CALIFORNIA MASSACHUSETTS INCLUDED

Political Glimpse Into Next Week Shows Many States Are Prepared to Hold Primaries and Convention to Name Complete Tickets—Many Important Issues Are to Be Settled at That Time.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 21.—New York Republicans will gather at Saratoga Wednesday to select candidates for governor and other state officers to be voted for in November. Leading aspirants for the gubernatorial nomination are former Speaker James Wadsworth, Jr., former Congressman William C. Bennett and Job E. Hedges of New York City.

In the general primary in New Jersey on Tuesday the voters of the two old parties will nominate candidates for all offices, from United States senator down to town constable. The third party men will have no standing in the primary, but will be obliged to nominate by petition. United States Senator Frank O. Briggs is unopposed for another term on the Republican side. Several are engaged in a spirited contest for the Democratic endorsement. The election of state senators is attracting attention, since upon the new state senate will depend the choice of a republican or democratic governor to fill out the unexpired year of Governor Wilson's term in the event of his election to the presidency.

Republicans and Democrats of Massachusetts will name complete state tickets in the primaries Tuesday. The Progressives, as a party, will take no part in the primaries.

Governor Ross is a candidate for re-nomination on the Democratic ticket and is opposed by District Attorney Pelletier, of Boston. Joseph Walker, former speaker of the state assembly, and Everett C. Benton, a business man of the town of Belmont, are contesting for the Republican nomination for governor. The legislature, for which nominations will be made, will have the choosing of a United States senator to succeed Senator Crane.

The several political parties in California will meet in State convention Tuesday to draft platforms and choose their slates of presidential electors. Michigan Republicans will meet in Detroit to choose candidates for all state offices excepting the governorship.

President Taft's public engagements for the week call for his attendance in Washington for the opening of the International Congress of Hygiene and Demography. Later in the week he is expected to be present in Boston at the banquet in connection with the International Congress of Chambers of Commerce.

Colonel Roosevelt will carry his speech making tour through the south, covering the territory from Missouri and Arkansas to the Eastern coast. Governor Wilson will return home on Tuesday to cast his vote in the New Jersey primaries. The remainder of the week he will devote to a trip into the New England states.

## MRS. HARRIMAN CITED TO TELL PAST RECORDS

### WIDOW OF LATE RAILROAD WIZARD TO BE SUBPOENAED

#### DAUGHTER OF LATE COLONEL NELIUS BLISS INCLUDED

In Goign to the Very Bottom of 1904 Campaign Contributions Senate Committee Will Call Relatives of the Late Messrs. Bliss and Harriman—Committee Sends Out Subpoenas Today.

Washington, Sept. 21.—The senate campaign contributions investigating committee may call Mrs. E. H. Harriman as a witness to testify regarding her late husband's dealings with Colonel Roosevelt and the late Cornelius N. Bliss, national Republican treasurer in 1904. Sergeant at Arms Ransdell announced that he has subpoenaed Secretary C. T. White and General Counsel Elliott and Director Libby of the Standard Oil, John C. McCalk of the New York Life, Cornelius N. Bliss, Jr., son of the late treasurer—and G. C. Tegehoff, private secretary to Mr. Harriman.

The committee will probe all corporation campaign contributions to the bottom.

Other Women May Be Called. It is stated that Mrs. Harriman has not yet been subpoenaed but likely will be, to tell the senate committee what she knows of her late husband's political contributions.

Miss Lizzie Bliss, daughter of the late treasurer, also may be asked to testify at the senatorial inquiry.
