FRESH EGG CRUSADE ON

PORTLAND DEALERS ARE MADE TO DESIGNTE.

Can No Longer Sell Packed Eggs Under Fresh Egg Labels.

(Portland Journal.)
Announcement made yesterday by the determination of the state food officials to enforce the law against the substitution of storage eggs for the fresh product, has created a sensation in the trade here.

There are many dealers who welcome such a move and say that they are willing to aid the officials in every way possible to straighten out conditions so that the trade can be placed upon an honest basis. At the present time it is about as dishonest as could be.

The strict enforcement of the law would be a big aid to egg producers here. Even at the present time producers would be receiving fully five cents a dozen more for their strictly fresh eggs than they are getting. This would be brought about naturally by that certain per cent of the public which wants a better egg than it has been given and is willing to pay the price.

There is nothing wrong with the handling of eastern fresh eggs or even the storage product if the stock is labeled what it really is. A certain per cent of the trade would purchase the cheaper product in any event. The only help it would be to all those that really want the better quality and are willing to pay for them.

"It has been argued that it would be impossible to stop the sale of eastern or storage eggs as strictly fresh handler. "If the food officials would Oregon ranch eggs," said a well known appoint me as a deputy I would clean up the situation, although I am not looking for the job, because there is no money in it. Any honest official could do the same if he keeps at the task."
