Notice of Street Improvement.
To Whom It May Concern:—Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, on the 25th day of April, 1912, creating Improvement district No. 53, and designating Second street as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said Common Council, on the 21st day of August, 1912, whereby said Council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Second street in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by grading the street to the proper sub-grade, constructing concrete curbs, constructing drainage and by laying thereon gravel bitulithic pavement 40 feet in width, with full street intersections, the Council will ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected by and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

Commencing at a point on the south side of the right-of-way of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Company, where the west line of Second street intersects the same; thence northwest along said right-of-way 110 feet; thence southwesterly to the center of the north line, east and west of block 18, Grandy's addition to the city of La Grande, being a point due north of the center of block 18; thence south to the north line of Spring avenue; thence east to a point due south of the center of block 10, Grandy's addition to the city of La Grande; thence north to the south line of the right-of-way of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation Company; thence northwest to the place of beginning. And the property affected or benefited by said improvement is as follows:

All that portion of Second street from the south line of the O. W. R. & N. right-of-way to the north line of Spring avenue, and the west 1-2 of blocks 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10 and the east 1-2 of blocks 13, 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18 all in Grandy's addition to La Grande, Oregon; Also a tract of land lying between the south line of the O. W. R. & N. right-of-way, the west line of Second street, the north line of Palmer avenue and a line running north and south and parallel to Second street and distance therefrom 110 feet.

Notice is hereby further given that the Council will levy a special assessment on all property affected and benefited by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$18,522.19. That the Council will, on the 9th day of October, 1912, meet at the Council Chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock, p. m., to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.
