THAT MILLAGE TAX MEASURE

BILL PROVIDING SCHOOL TAX TO
BE VOTED UPON.

Governor and Committee Present a
Measure to Voters.

Gaston, Oregon, Sept. 27.—(Special)
The initiative millage tax bill, pro-
viding for a six tenths of a mill tax,
four sevenths for the use of the Agri-
cultural College, and three sevenths
for the use of the University, and pro-
viding also for a single board of Reg-
ents, was prepared by a joint commit-
tee from the Governor's special com-
mission appointed to solve Oregon's
higher educational problem, and from
the Boards of Regents of the two insti-
tutions working in conjunction with
the Governor and with the Presidents
of the two institutions, and is offered
as a substitute for all the present leg-
islative bills for the support and gov-
ernment of the two institutions.

This bill does not increase the aver-
age rate of taxation for the support of
the two institutions as shown during
the last ten years. The average dur-
ing this period is a trifle over six
tenths of a mill.

The state of Washington is at present
paying for the same purposes seven-
teen hundredths of a mill more than
the Oregon bill calls for; namely, forty
five hundredths of a mill for the Uni-
versity and thirty two hundredths
of a mill for the Agricultural college.

The growth of the two institutions
will certainly keep pace with the
growth of wealth in the state, as has
been shown by the experience of all
other states using the millage basis of
support.

This bill expressly repeals the
\$500,000 appropriations of the legis-
lative session of two years ago, now
submitted to the voters under the refer-
endum (official numbers on the bal-
lot, 372, 373, 374, 375.) for their approv-
al or rejection.

The present standing appropriat-
ions to be continued for one year are
most urgently needed to give the in-
stitutions a start in buildings and to
carry them through the period while
the mill tax is being collected.

The passage of this bill will take the
University and Agricultural College
out of politics. The efficiency and
dignity of the institutions demand per-
manency of support and freedom from
political entanglements.

Through the unified control of the
single board, hearty co-operation of
the two institutions will be insured.
The advantages of a combined insti-
tution will be secured, and the advan-
tages which come from segregation
will not be sacrificed.

Since the millage bill involves the
question of taxation, it should be taken
directly to the people. It is there-
fore not an abuse but a proper use of
the initiative law, and the bill should
be voted upon its merits.

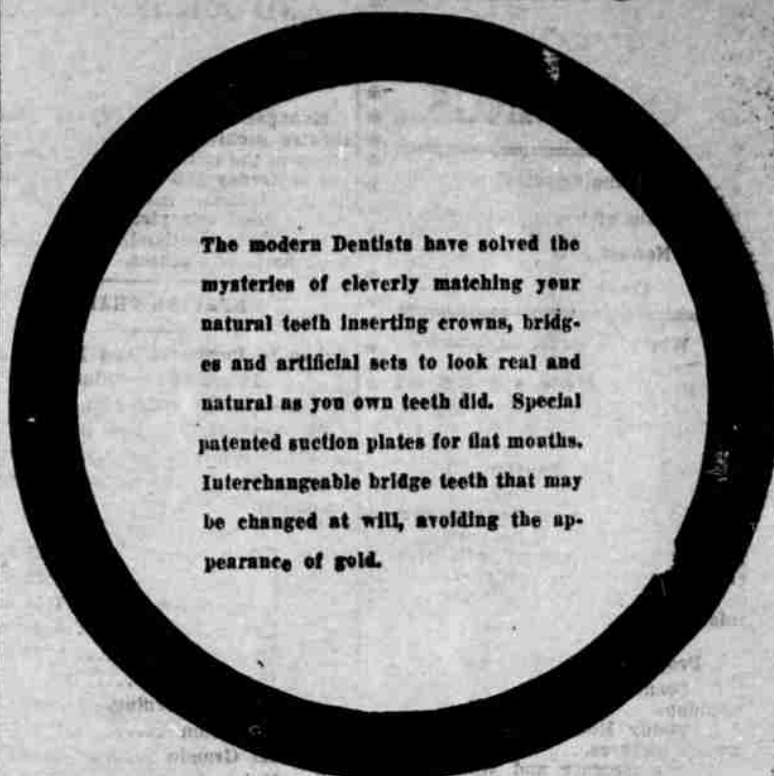
