MISSIONARY WITH 40 YEARS EXPERIENCE COMING.

Many of World's Well Known Land Marks are Personally Known.

La Grande, Sept. 28.—(To the Editor)—It is rarely that a practical Orientalist of nearly forty years' experience visits La Grande and through your columns I beg leave to introduce him to the people of our city.

The Rev. R. M. Cole, D. D., now a resident of Forest Grove, but for many years a missionary in Eastern Turkey, is spending a few days here and under the auspices of the Missions Committee of the Forward Movement will give an address Sunday evening at 7:30 upon his life and experiences in the Turkish Empire.

This will doubtless be one of the most interesting of a series of lectures, some of them illustrated, upon Christianity in its world aspects, to be given during the winter.

Dr. Cole is personally familiar with such land marks, geographical and historic, as Mount Ararat, of Noah's ark fame, and the siege of Erzurum in the Russo-Turkish war. Massacre fire and ship wreck have added their burdens of dire experience and made him a character good to know.
