**PIERCE-UREN DEBATE.**

verbatim from the official report of that commission when Mr. U'Ren told the commissioners in the New York conference the following:  
"I read 'Progress and Poverty' in 1882 and I went just as crazy over the single tax idea as anyone else ever did. I knew I wanted the single tax and that was about all I did know. I thought I could get it by agitation and was often disgusted with the world that refused to be agitated for what I wanted. In 1882 I learned what the initiative and referendum is and then I saw the way to single tax. Takes New Tactics.  
"So I quit talking single tax, not because I was any the less in favor of it, but because I saw that the first job was to get the initiative and referendum so that the people independently of the legislature may get what they want rather than take what the legislature will let them have. We have cleared the way for a straight single tax fight in Oregon. All the work we have done for direct legislation has been done with the single tax in view, but we have not talked single tax because that was not the

question before the house. Now that question is before the house in Oregon and we will discuss it. In that state since we first begun our work while we had the single tax as the goal in view, we have confined ourselves to the questions to be voted on at the next election. To do otherwise is to confuse the voters.  
"The Joseph Fels Fund commission began its work with a definite aim to put the single tax into operation somewhere in the United States within five years and it will succeed in that operation."  
Mr. Pierce dwelt at length upon the issue and brought the fight nearer home by the assertion that the ultimate aim of the single taxers is to take the value out of land that it would have to be confiscated by the state to pay taxes as the rate of taxation on large tracts of land is such that the amount would be confiscatory while the millionaires who own manufacturing plants, are not classed as land values, would escape every cent of taxation. This method, said Mr. Pierce, would tend to drive land titles now vested in the names of Union county people into the archives of Salem, and there place them to the credit of the state and the former owner suffer thereby.  
Mr. Pierce recited how about a year ago, at a meeting of the single tax committee in the Y. M. C. A. building, Portland, voted down a proposition to exempt from \$500 to \$1000 worth of land as an incentive to the poor who were unable to pay taxes. Mr. U'Ren, Mr. Cridge, E. S. J. McAllister and Dr. Chapman, with others, voted this down, saying not a foot of land in Oregon must be allowed to escape.  
**Mr. U'Ren's Opinions.**  
"If this experiment we introduce does not work out, we can repeal it," affirmed Mr. U'Ren, in his statement of the case. Mr. U'Ren read statistical tables showing how figures proved that the plan advocated by him would be beneficial. He showed a transcript from the Clackamas tax roll which had cost \$10,000 to prepare, indicating that the farmers would save taxes if it were adopted. The assessor of Clackamas county has later stated that there were 104 errors in the roll thus prepared.  
After the meeting last evening Mr. Pierce challenged Mr. U'Ren to a debate at Union, but met with no success. However, Mr. Pierce will deliver a lecture on that question at Union tonight.  
Mr. Jasper, a prosperous rancher of this county, also spoke last evening at the L. D. S. tabernacle.
