FARM EXHIBITORS ADVISED.
Portland, Oct. 2.—Oregon farmers who are interested in entering the

world's greatest wheat-growing contest, whereby \$5,000 may be won for the best five bushels of wheat grown this season in the Northwest and exhibited in the Northwest Land Products Exposition at Minneapolis, November 12 to 23, are assured that it will not be necessary to have the field measured where the wheat was grown nor to have affidavits accompany the exhibit. In the entry blanks to be filled out by the exhibitor, the size of the field in which the wheat was grown will be sufficient. If there is any doubt in the minds of the judges, the management of the show will send out investigators to inquire into any doubtful statements. The prize offered is a traction engine and outfit of plows valued at \$5,000.

Seven states and Alaska propose to exhibit their best products. All of these sections have tempting opportunities to offer to settlers and investors, and the various sections of this great territory will make individual displays calculated to show the easterner what awaits him in the Northwest.

It is estimated that not less than 200,000 people will visit the exposition, most of whom will come from the eastern part of the United States. The railroads are aiding the show in every way and will have big displays of special exhibits supplementing the showings of various states.

It is understood that a considerable number of Oregon wheat growers will have a try for this big prize. The wheat must amount to at least five bushels and should be shipped to Will A. Campbell at Minneapolis so as to reach him by November 1.
