DAVE CHANDNER LAID TO REST

WELL-KNOWN PIONEER PASSES AT DURKEE.

Funeral Services Held in Lower Cove Late This Afternoon.
David Chandler, one of Union coun-

ty's best known and oldest pioneers, was buried in Lower Cove this afternoon. His demise occurred at Durkee Sunday morning and the remains were brought to La Grande and shipped out to Cove this afternoon and the body was from there taken to the Chandler home in Lower Cove, where funeral services were held.

Mr. Chandler is survived by a large family of sons, most of whom live in Union county, but one son residing in Portland and another in Durkee.

ed citizen of Baker and one of the early Oregon pioneers who made the history of this territory, died at his home on Twelfth street about 11 o'clock last evening, following a long illness, during which he has suffered from a complication of diseases, says the Baker Democrat. He had been in a critical condition for several weeks and his demise was expected for some time prior to the end.

Mr. McCord was born December 6, 1839, in Mercer county, Pennsylvania. As a young boy he moved with his parents to Mifflin, Wis., leaving there

for Oregon May 7, 1862. He was accompanied by his father, O. H. McCord, now deceased, and David Kelly, who now resides near this city. With three horses, a wagon and other equipment they arrived at what is now the Pocahontas district September 10, 1862. The three placer mined in what is now known as McCord gulch, about 10 miles west of Baker. After spending some time in the quest of gold, McCord located in Baker, where he built and conducted the first blacksmith shop the then frontier village boasted. Later he engaged in the bakery business and conducted a livery stable. He was prominent in public life in the early days and served as county treasurer from 1882 to 1884. Robert McCord was a man always held in high esteem and represented a class of men who braved the hardships of the early days to make this great country for the generations to come. His death marks the passing of one more of these pioneers, whose numbers are fast diminishing, but whose memory will always be held in highest honor and respect.

The arrangements for the funeral have not yet been announced.
