HUMOROUS INCIDENTS ON TRAFFIC LAW TRAIL.

Owners of carriages and vehicles other than automobiles will have to mind their ps and qs while driving on La Grande's streets for hereafter Chief of Police McLaughlin is going after them hammer and tongs as he has after the automobile men. Farmers are often violators of the traffic ordinances, but this is generally due to ignorance of the law and the chief and his lieutenants have made it a practice to notify the farmers the first offense. Adolph Newlin, however, is deemed by the police to be in a class where ignorance of the law is no valid excuse and he has been called upon to contribute \$5 for hitching his horse on the wrong side of the street. Automobile men are being fined quite frequently for both turning in the middle of the block and for not facing their cars correctly. Cutting the corners at too high a speed is also a frequent offense that causes \$5 to percolate into city exchequers.

Pellagra Conference Meets.

Columbia, S. C., Oct. 3.—Many medical men of international prominence were present here today at the opening of the second triennial conference of the National association for the study of Pellagra. The initial session was held this morning in the assembly hall of the South Carolina State Asylum for the Insane. Dr. J. W. Babcock, superintendent of the asylum and president of the association, occupied the chair. During the day papers or addresses dealing with the prevalence and geographic distribution of Pellagra and possible factors in the causation of the disease were presented by Dr. J. F. Siler, of the medical corps of the United States army; Dr. P. E. Garrison, assistant surgeon of the United States navy; Dr. W. J. McNeal, of New York City; Dr. R. M. Grimm, assistant surgeon of the United States public health and marine hospital service; Dr. H. H. Hagen, of Washington, D. C.; Dr. K. H. Beall, of the Texas state board of health, and Allan H. Jennings, of the bureau of entomology of the United States department of agriculture.

Wife Slayer to Hang.

Montreal, Oct. 3.—Apparently reconciled to his fate, though with little left of the iron nerve that he displayed throughout his trial, John Cummings, the wife slayer, is awaiting the dawn of tomorrow, when he will mount the scaffold in the Montreal jail to pay the full penalty of the law. The crime for which he is to be executed was committed on November 21 last. Early in the evening of that day Cummings approached his wife, with whom he had not been living for some time, as she was walking in the street with a young man, and fired two shots, killing her almost instantly. The evidence showed that Cummings had been drinking on the day of the murder, and that he had previously made threats against his wife.

Railroad Y. M. C. A. Meeting.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 3.—The presidents of half a dozen of the leading railroads of the country are scheduled to assemble in Chicago today for a four day conference of the Railroad Young Men's Christian Associations, which assembled in Chicago today for a four day session. In addition to the railroad executives the speakers will include J. A. McDonald and George A. Warburton of Toronto, Rev. James E. Freeman of Minneapolis, and Dr. Geo. L. Robinson of McCormick Theological Seminary. Miss Helen M. Gould, who has made many large gifts to the Y. M. C. A., is to be the guest of honor at the convention banquet.

Spiritualists Gather in Dallas.

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 3.—It is doubtful if any city of the United States or of any other country has ever been the meeting place of such a large and representative gathering of spiritualists as will be entertained in Dallas during the next ten days. The occasion of the gathering is the annual convention of the National association of Spiritualists, an organization formed in 1892 and embracing in its membership 22 state associations and upwards of 1000 local societies. The president of the association is Dr. George B. Warne of Chicago, who will preside at the convention. Among the speakers will be some of the foremost lecturers and mediums of America and Europe.

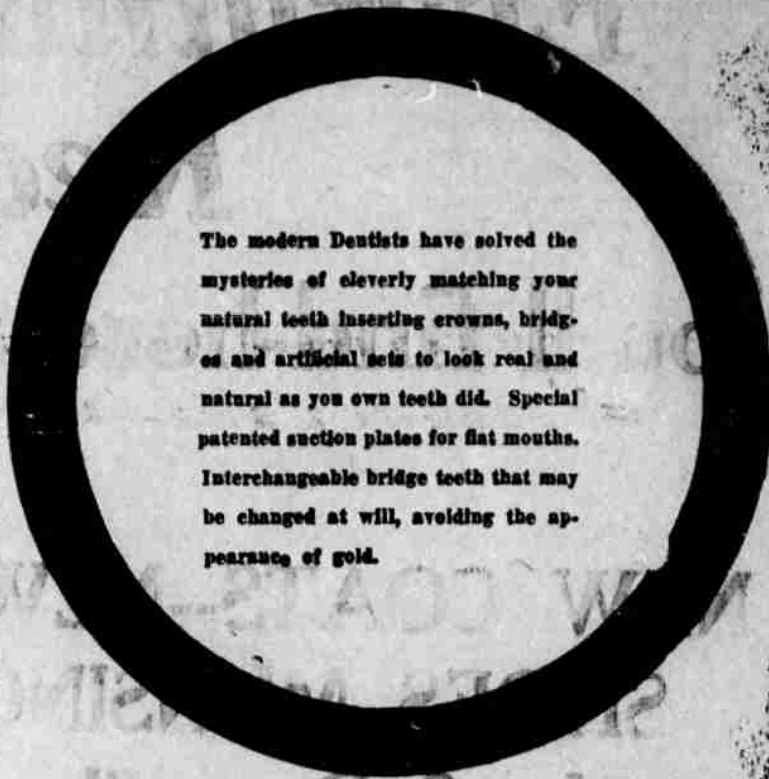
President Taft To Take Part.
