Getting Ready for Great Naval Show.

New York, Oct. 3.—The first of the American warships that will take part in the great naval review here week after next has put in appearance and another week, it is expected, will see all of the ships, big and little, swinging at anchor in the Hudson. So numerous will the craft be that they will form an almost unbroken column extending from a point opposite Twenty-third street up the river as far as Yonkers. More than 700,000 tons of fighting ships and naval auxiliaries will be in this display, and of the grand total more than 450,000 tons will be superdreadnoughts, dreadnoughts, first-class battleships and armor-clad cruisers.
