### J. D. GILLILAN WRITES FROM NEW DISTRICT IN IDAHO

Boise, Oct 6.—(To the Editor) — Were I a disciple of Fate, I would think her Nemesis were on my trail; for, while a former district I had extended from Seven Devils to Paradise, this one I now serve has been so made that it reaches from the same Seven Devils to Bliss. I prefer starting at the diabolical end of the tramp and ending in the place with so happy a name, but to be frank: If the latter were not named it would be hard for a foreigner to tell the difference between the two. Yet there are worse places than either. "What's in a name, anyway?"

My work keeps me on the road all the time, but there are more miles of railway than I had in the La Grande country and it is easier to get to and from my appointments, all but half a dozen or so can be reached by steam or trolley. A few, such as Ola, Thunder, Roseberry and Jordan Valley must be found by stage line. The latter is the only one of my appointments in

the state of Oregon. Much of the country is under new irrigation projects and all of it depends upon the friendly ditch. The highest dam in the world is being created at Arrowrock a few miles up the Boise river; this is to cover many square miles of sagebrush acreage, making it over into as good fruitful fields of farming possibilities as are to be found anywhere. Several new towns are springing up in different places in these new tracts, such as Wilder, Homedale, Greenleaf and others. Some of these are making elaborate pretensions to civilized character already and are planning long-headedly for a future that is as certain as water in the ditches is certain. They have this assurance too, that so long as Nature keeps her health and operates normally, there will be the usual winter snow, the summer sun melting it and the force of gravity regulating the water thus generated. #### NOTES FROM LABOR WORLD

Members of the San Francisco fire department demand a twelve-hour workday.

In the year ending August 1, 1912, nearly sixty thousand persons sought and obtained employments through the medium of the three state employment bureaus in Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth.

Industrially, Belgium is the most highly developed country in Europe. It has at the present time a population of about eight millions, of which 1,250,000 persons are engaged in industrial pursuits. 300,000 of them are women.

In every state in Australia as well as in the commonwealth there are now two parties only, Liberal and Labor. In the commonwealth and in the states of New South Wales and West Australia the Laborites are in power while in the other states the Liberals have at present a controlling majority.

Bricklayers and Masons Union No. 1 of Winnipeg, Man., is now the largest local union in Canada. It has a membership of more than 1200 and is also strong financially.

Thirty-seven states have employers' liability laws, in seventeen of which the old common law defense of "fellow servant" has been abrogated and in seven others modified, and several states have modified the common law defense of "assumed risk" and "contributory negligence."

There are six million girls working in the factories, shops and stores of the United States, according to Miss Alice Henry, of Chicago, editress of Life and Labor. The girls range in age from fourteen to twenty-four years and their average wage, according to Miss Henry's figures, is about \$6 a week.

France, according to Consul General Alphonse Gaulin, stationed at Barselens, has probably the most comprehensive co-operative societies of any country in the world. There are co-operative stores and organizations of every kind for the aid of the toilers, its members. The movement has grown immensely in recent years.

  - Directed investigation of the sugar trust customs frauds, and the resultant prosecution.
  - Suits begun against the Standard Oil and Tobacco companies and other corporations for violation of the Sherman anti-trust act.
  - Corporations forbidden to contribute to political campaign funds.
  - Inauguration of movement for conservation of natural resources.
  - Inauguration of movement for improvement of conditions of country life.
  - The Panama policy and action which made possible the most colossal work of all time.
  - During his term in the white house President Roosevelt was the most conspicuous friend of peace in the civilized world, and won the Nobel peace prize. Among his achievements in that line were:
    - Second intervention in Cuba to establish peace.
    - Alaska boundary dispute settled.
    - China saved from partition and policy of open door established.
    - Twenty-four treaties of general arbitration negotiated.
    - Negotiations opened by which Russo-Japanese war was ended.
    - Avoidance of bad feeling with Japan over exclusion policy.
  - Among the policies urged by President Roosevelt, to whose leadership the public sentiment in these matters is largely due, are:
    - Reform of the banking and currency system.
    - Inheritance tax.
    - Income tax.
    - Passage of a new employers' liability act to meet objections raised by the supreme court.
    - Postal savings banks.
    - Parcels post.
    - Revision of the Sherman anti-trust act.
    - Legislation to prevent over-capitalization, stock watering, etc., of common carriers.
    - Legislation compelling incorporation under federal laws of corporations engaged in interstate commerce.

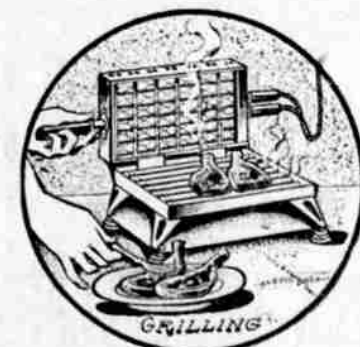
