Eastern Brands Come Early for Holiday Trade—Butter up.

Bringing advanced notice of the speedy arrival of Thanksgiving and then the holidays, come cranberries to the local market this week, the introductory price being 20 cents per pound, or two pounds for 35c. These are the Eastern brands entirely and come in pretty good quality so that those who wish to get in early on the big Thanksgiving dish can do so now. Minor changes throughout the market list are noted today. Peaches are down a trifle, cantaloupes disappear entirely, watermelons are gone, roasting corn is about a minus quantity and in other departments changes are noted.

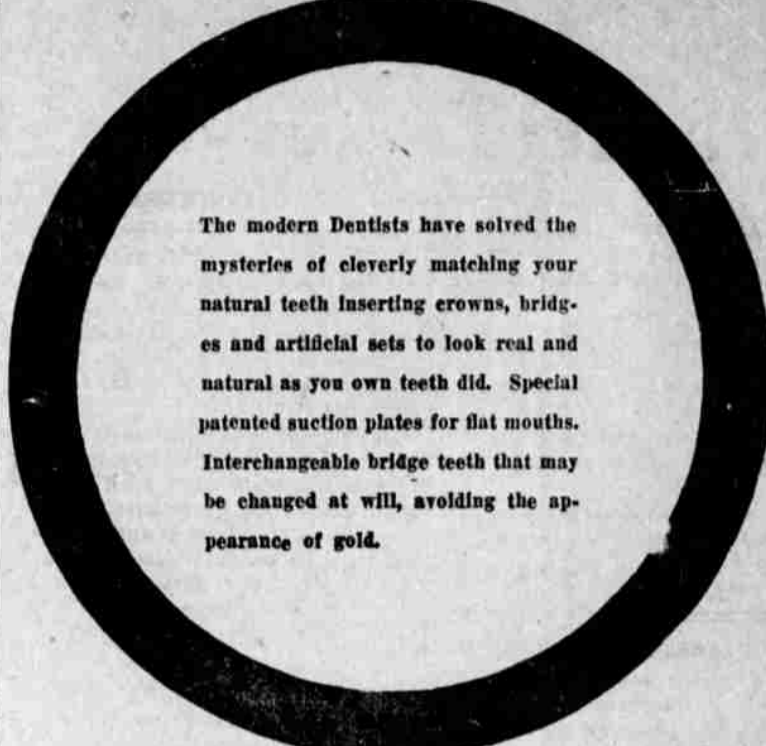
