### STANDING OF THE SERIES. Red Sox 1; Giants 0.

Polo Grounds, Oct. 8.—Outhit, it is true, but having bunched her bingles in the sixth and seventh, the Red Sox won the first game from New York in a three-four score affair here today. New York opened and finished like cyclones but failed to stop a winning streak in the sixth and seventh which Boston made good advantage of and got away with the game. The teams appeared in their old uniforms. Captain Larry Doyle of the Giants was presented with an automobile as the most valuable player in the National league.

The Red Sox appeared at 12:48 and the Giants at 12:53. Mayor Gaynor of New York appeared and was ovation.

## H. HEITMULLER DIES SUDDENLY

### TYPHOID CLAIMS POPULAR COAST PLAYER

Coast Baseball Circles Grieved at the Death of Coast Star.

### HEITMULLER DEAD.

Los Angeles, Oct. 8.—Heine Heitmuller, a famous outfielder for the Los Angeles club in the Coast league, and a league star, died at the hospital here this morning. Heine was known up and down the coast as a terrific hitter. He died of typhoid.

Los Angeles, Oct. 8.—President Alan Baum of the Pacific Coast league paid a tribute to Heitmuller. "I have known Heitmuller for years," he declared. "Gentlemanly, even tempered, he was greatly beloved by his fellow."

Heitmuller, after graduation from the University of California, joined the Oakland team, and later the Philadelphia Americans. He was purchased from Baltimore by Los Angeles.

### Iowa Equal Suffrage Meet.

Des Moines, Ia., Oct. 8.—At a conference of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association here today preliminary steps were taken in what is intended to be the most active campaign that the women of the Hawkeye state have ever waged in an effort to secure the right of franchise. For the present the women will devote their efforts toward securing the election of those candidates for the legislature who have declared themselves favorable to the proposed suffrage amendment to the state constitution.

### To Try Woman for Killing Husband.

Bedford, Ind., Oct. 8.—The case of Mrs. Mand Ping, charged with the murder of her husband several months ago, is to be called for trial tomorrow. The case has attracted considerable attention and the trial is awaited with much interest. Mrs. Ping is alleged to have shot and killed her husband James Ping, following a quarrel at the supper table. The woman then shot herself in an attempt at suicide, but recovered from her wounds and has since been confined in the county jail awaiting trial.

## POWERS DUBIOUS OVER ABILITY TO PREVENT WARS

### WAR AGAINST TURKEY IS DECLARED TODAY

### SERBIA AND GREECE ARE DEEMED CERTAIN TO FOLLOW

Passports issued to Turkish officials at Cetinje and Montenegro consuls have been recalled—Every indication points to speedy warfare between the countries involved in the Embroglio.

London, Oct. 8.—A dispatch to Reuter's agency from Cetinje, Montenegro, says that Montenegro has declared war against Turkey and heavy fighting on the Montenegrin frontier is reported. Confirmation of the reported declaration of war was received by the Montenegrin consul-general and the Montenegrin representative at Constantinople has been ordered home. Passports have been handed the Turkish charge d'affaires at Cetinje and London diplomats are depressed. It is believed to be impossible for the powers to prevent Bulgaria, Serbia and Greece from declaring war.

### Unlimited Powers Given.

Vienna, Oct. 8.—After empowering the rulers to go any length in enforcing demands upon Turkey, the Bulgarian and Serbian parliaments have adjourned, according to dispatches received here. It is predicted that the Macedonians will rebel against Turkey.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Oct. 8.—On behalf of European powers, the Austrian and Russian ministers here made a joint representation to the Bulgarian government at noon expressing disapproval of the powers over the warlike attitude in the Balkan states. They urged prompt cessation of the military governments.

### Pothier a Fifth-Term Candidate.

Providence, R. I., Oct. 8.—Aran J. Pothier, the first French-Canadian ever honored with the governorship of any of the states, will be nominated for a fifth term as governor of Rhode Island by the Republican state convention which is to meet here tomorrow. It is expected that practically all of the other state officers will also be renominated.

### Johnson Visits Yonkers.

Yonkers, N. Y., Oct. 8.—Governor Johnson of California, spoke here this morning. He left later for White Plains and New Rochelle.
