An Uncanny Old Mansion.

The old manor house of Fritwell, near Ranbury, has been the scene of several tragedies, and the local legend is that it is haunted by the ghosts of two of the victims. In a duel there a Mr. Jackson was killed about the year 1712, when the place was let to a family named Longueville. There were two brothers, both of whom were in love with the same woman. The younger imprisoned the other in a human dog kennel in an attic, so the story runs, and kept him there for fourteen years until he died of starvation. A few years later Sir Baldwin Wake bought the estate. Sir Baldwin and his two sons were playing cards very late one night when a quarrel arose. The tradition is that the father struck his eldest son so heavy a blow that he died immediately. The father and the youngest son concealed the body in the kennel which had seen the death of Longueville. Twelve years afterward Sir Baldwin is said to have confessed on his deathbed that he had caused the death of his son. The human dog kennel, to which access was gained through the sliding back of a cupboard, remained until ten years ago, when the house was renovated.—Dun-see Advertiser.

The World's Population.

The total population of the world is now estimated at 1,700,000,000. This is based upon the most recent censuses, which all civilized countries now take, with a careful estimate of the number of inhabitants of uncivilized lands. The proportion of the sexes is known for 1,038,000,000 of these, the ratio being 1,000 males to 990 females. The ratio varies considerably in different places. In Europe there are 1,000 men to 1,027 women; in Africa, 1,000 men to 1,045 women; in America, 1,000 men to 964 women; in Asia, 1,000 men to 961 women; in Australia, 1,000 men to 937 women. The highest proportion of women is found in Uganda, where there are 1,467 to every 1,000 men. The lowest proportion is in Alaska and the Malay states, where there are, in the former, 391, and in the latter 389 women to every 1,000 men. — New York World.

Pickled Peppers.

Sailors' Queer Customs.

The sailors' broad collars were devised so that the powder or tar on the wearer's cues should not come off on the blouses. In those days every sailor wore his hair in a cue and either had the cue powdered or held together by tar. This was not good for the blouse or jacket underneath. So detachable broad collars were added. Sailors stopped wearing cues a century ago. But they still wear the wide collar. When Lord Nelson died the British navy went into mourning for him. Sailors put broad black ribbons on their caps and black ribbons on their blouses. And the ribbons remain to this day not only on the uniforms of British sailors, but on those of other navies as well. The broad "bell shaped" ends of sailors' trousers legs were thus shaped so that the wearer might more easily turn his trousers up above his knees when he had to swab the decks. Deck swabbing was a hateful and supposedly degrading task. Hence the sailors called their enemies "swabs" as a term of contempt.

The institution opened in 1837 with 80 students. Today it has about 800 students enrolled and in the 75 years of its history the college has bestowed diplomas upon nearly 5,000 graduates.
