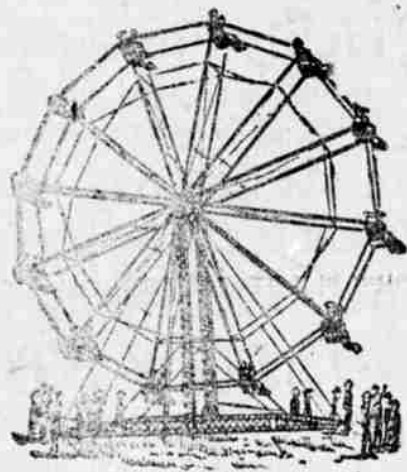

"WOMEN VOTES" IS OPPOSED

There are over 100,000 women in Oregon. The majority of them do not want to vote. A small proportion in any given community is asking for the ballot. Is this not true in your town? What do the rest want?

Many of them are actively opposed. To put upon these women a responsibility from which they have hitherto been exempted and which they do not wish to assume, is not "Woman's Rights."

Many of them are indifferent. The indifferent male voter is one of the serious problems of the present electorate. Would you add to it a large body of votes avowedly indifferent? The demand for women suffrage is the demand that women shall assume an equal share with man in the responsibility of carrying on the government of the city, the state, the nation. It means she shall enter with him the political arena. For it is an arena. Politics is not a conflict of opinions, it is a conflict of wills. It carries with it public meetings, public debates, public marchings and counter-marchings, public discussions of public questions, and of the character of public candidates, and all the other incidents of a campaign.

It is not democratic, nor just, nor fair to draft this large body of women into this campaign against their wills.

This is the sixth time the voters of Oregon have been asked to vote upon this question in spite of the fact that every two years the opposition to it has increased so that in 1910 suffrage carried in only one county in Oregon, and in that one by five votes, the total vote being 35,270 for suffrage, the small vote for it since 1900, and 59,065 against, a majority of 23,795.

The Oregon State Association Opposed to the Extension of the Suffrage to Women asks that you give this amendment your earnest consideration, and that you defeat it this time by so great a plurality that the suffragists, local and imported, must bow before the will of the people of Oregon, and acknowledge that the majority rules in America.

Discuss Needs of Legislation. Charleston, W. Va., Oct. 10.—Delegates from West Virginia trades unions, together with representatives of various civic, commercial and church organizations, assembled here for a state convention today to discuss legislative needs growing out of the miners' strike in the Pain Creek and Cab in Creek regions, where martial law was declared some time ago. The guard system, woman and child labor, the minimum wage law, the initiative and referendum, liability and workmen's compensation acts, and the conferring of additional powers on the governor of the state to enforce the law were among the subjects taken up by the conference.

Erasmus Hall Celebration. New York, Oct. 10.—Public officials of the estate and city, together with many noted educators from various parts of the country, took part today in the opening of the celebration of the 125th anniversary of Erasmus Hall high school in the Flatbush section of Brooklyn. The dedication of the new school building took place this afternoon and was followed by the first presentation of an elaborate pageant illustrating the history of New York from its first settlement by the Dutch down to the present time. The celebration will continue over tomorrow.

Son of Sir Arthur Elliott Weds. New York, Oct. 10.—A wedding of note took place at Southampton, L. I., today, when Miss Flournoy Adams Hopkins became the bride of Gilbert Elliott, the only son of Sir Arthur and Lady Elliott. The bride belongs to a family that has long been socially prominent in New York. Sir Arthur Elliott, who succeeded to the English title several years ago, has lived for many years in this country, and both he and his son have business interests here, the latter being a stock broker. Lady Elliott is a member of the New York Yacht Club.

GRAPES FALL, ORANGES RISE

TOMATOES PRACTICALLY GONE SAY GROCERS.

Quinces Enter Market Selling Three Pounds for 25 Cents.

Oranges up five cents—making the quotation 50 cents—Concord grapes down five cents, Tokay grapes selling at 50 cents, and quinces entering the market at a sale price of three pounds for a quarter, are some of the important items of interest from the markets today. The day of roasting corn, cantaloupes and watermelons is gone for this year, and tomatoes will soon be in the out of season class. Straggling lots of tomatoes show up this week, but the crop is rapidly dwindling to nothing and those wanting tomatoes had best get the order filled right now for it will soon be too late.

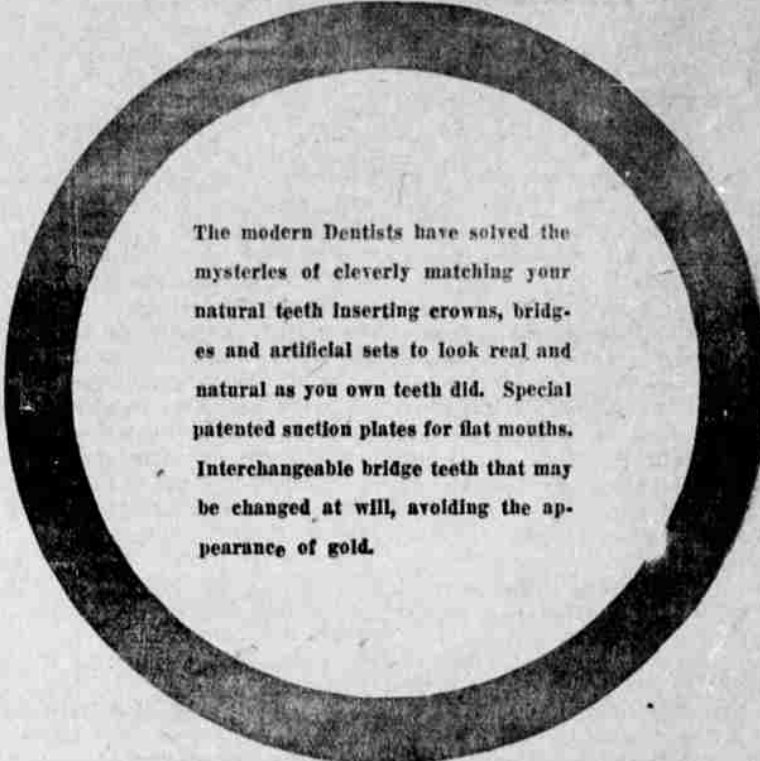
