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WOOD COMES BACK AND WINS FROM NEW YORK BY A SCORE OF 3 TO 1

TESREAU AND AMES FAIL TO HALT BOSTON

SCORING EARLY BEAN-EATERS ARE SAFE

NEW YORK AGAIN SCORES ONE THE MOST IN HIT LIST

Banner Crowds of All Times Present to See the Third Contest Go to Boston by Safe Margin—Wood Good at All Times, Easing up at the Last, However, Letting One In—Tesreau Bench in Seventh.

STANDING OF THE SERIES.

Boston 2; New York 1.

Polo Grounds, New York, Oct. 11.—Once again "Smoky" Wood carried the Red Sox banner to victory today and he did it with Jeff Tesreau on the firing line against him for the major portion of the game again. Like the first game he won, Wood allowed one more hit than the opposing pitchers allowed, but got away with it for all that. In the second inning Boston got a lead when Gardner tripled to the right fence scoring soon afterwards on Tesreau's wild pitch.

Again in the fourth, Boston increased her lead by a combination of events. Gardner walked and was forced at second by Stahl, who stole second and went third on a sacrifice. Cady produced the needed bingle and scored Stahl from third.

Like the first game, Tesreau was forced to seek shelter in the seventh. When it came his turn to bat, McCormack took the willow and in the beginning of the eighth, Ames went to the pitching mound for McGraw. New York signaled the advent of a new pitcher by shutting out Boston in that inning.

In the seventh Herzog singled for New York and Fletcher saved the Giants from a shutout by doubling, scoring Herzog.

In the last inning, Boston got her third run when Gardner again broke into the hitting game and singled to center field. Stahl sacrificed and Wagner walked, Cady forcing Wagner at second and Wood helped win his own game by singling and scoring Gardner.

The bleachers were practically filled at 1:30 o'clock, and 35,000 were present when the game was started. The outfield was soggy and the turf wet, and it was figured the conditions would aid the bean-eaters and handicapped Tesreau.

Tris Speaker's ankle was badly wrenched yesterday, and when Boston appeared on the field at 12:55, Speaker was limping. Marquard and Devers were given an ovation.

It was extremely cold and cloudy this morning and the fans were hopeful for good weather. Rain threatened at 11 o'clock and the umpires inspected the field to determine whether the game should be played or not. They found it permissible to play.

The national commission compelled the crowds to wait until 11 before opening the gates, many standing in the line seven and eight hours.

When the gates to the Polo grounds were opened a mad rush to the seats started and indications pointed to a record crowd of any world series game.

Messenger Is Martyr

KANSAS EXPRESS EMPLOYEE GIVES HIS LIFE.

THUGS FRUSTRATED

Four Attack Him, but He Shoots One and Seals Lips.

Port Smith, Ark., Oct. 11.—While four masked bandits were trying to break into an express car on the Kansas City Southern railway at Hatfield, Ark., early this morning, Messenger Merrill Burgett opened the safes and hid the valuables. He fired on the bandits, wounding one, but a companion picked up the wounded man and jumped from the car and escaped.

The two remaining robbers smashed in the door. Burgett's ammunition was gone but he put up a hand to hand fight, but was beaten insensibly.

Unable to locate the treasure, the thugs tortured Burgett. He still refused to tell and was beaten unconscious. When the train reached Potter, Ark., the bandits cut the air hose, stopped the train, and vanished.

Burgett is dying.
A posse is out after the thugs.

JOHNSON AFTER PENROSE.

ACTUAL BLAME PUT ON LEWIS

KRAUS' TESTIMONY AGAINST BECKER DENIED.

Eye Witness to Rosenthal Killing Says One Shot Killed Him.

New York, Oct. 11.—Attorneys for Becker announced this morning that they would prove that Louis Kraus, a waiter, was not present at the shooting of Gambler Herman Rosenthal. Kraus has testified that he was present and recognized "Lefty Louie," "Gyp the Blood," and "Whitey" Lewis, the men who shot Rosenthal.

Reports were current in the courtroom that "Lefty Louie" Rosenberg, and "Dago Frank" Cirofici, alleged to be implicated in the Rosenthal murder were ready to confess. The rumors were not verified. Thomas Ryan, a taxicab driver, who assisted in the pursuit of the murderers, testified that one man did the shooting, contradicting the testimony of Kraus who swore several shots were fired by three men. John Standish says he witnessed the murder and testified that "Whitey" Lewis fired the shot that killed Rosenthal.

Wood at Tacoma.

Tacoma, Oct. 11.—Major General Leonard M. Wood, chief of staff of the American army, arrived in Tacoma at 9 o'clock this morning. He has taken an inspection of the surrounding country under guidance of a committee of the Commercial club.

Helmuller Buried Today.

San Francisco, Oct. 11.—On account of the funeral this afternoon of "Heine" Helmuller, the Los Angeles outfielder, the San Francisco and Portland game was postponed. There will be a double header tomorrow.

Man Steals Girl's Gown

CLOTHES-LINE ROBBED OF VALUABLES.

SUSPECT IS SEEN

Evening Prowler Seen by Several Just Before Garment Is Taken.

A valuable gown belonging to Miss Bertha Bue, a waitress at the Model restaurant, was removed from a clothes-line at the girl's home, 2009 North Fir, last evening just after dusk. Miss Bue lives at the home of Mrs. Della Pollock, and it was she who discovered the loss last evening. That a man took the gown is apparent, judging from the clumsiness of the job and the promiscuous method the clothes pins had been thrown about. About half an hour before the loss was noticed, a man was seen near the premises. Neighbors noticed his presence along the street and it was while in the glare of lights that he was seen and several would readily identify him if they saw him again.

"I shall certainly be glad to get the gown back and ask no questions," said the loser last evening, "but I shall also institute a search to find and punish the thief unless it is returned at once."

GOMPERS' NAME HEARD.

Trial of Alleged Dynamiters Brings Leader's Name Forward.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 11.—The name of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was brought into the trial of 47 laborites this morning when Frank Schilling, a St. Louis hotel clerk, told of an alleged meeting of Gompers and Olaf A. Tvietmoe in the Southern hotel at St. Louis November 27, 1908. The testimony was admitted despite the objection of Senator John W. Kern of Indianapolis, counsel for the defense.

G. A. Dixon, clerk of the Argonaut hotel, at San Francisco, testified that a man giving the name of B. Bryce registered there in 1910 and identified a photograph of James B. McNamara as "Brice." George Hunter of Youngtown, Idaho, a hotel clerk, testified that H. S. Hockin, one of the defendants, was once registered at his hotel.

GRAND JURY CHARGES MANY

THREE OF A HALF DOZEN INDICTED PLEAD.

Ray Clark Perjury Case Brought to Trial This Afternoon.

Three men were arraigned this afternoon in circuit court and the time for their respective trials set, following a return of a half dozen true bills by the grand jury. Harry McCleary, charged with larceny, had no attorney and the court appointed Robert Eakin to defend him. His trial was set for tomorrow at 9 a. m. J. M. Johnson, charged with larceny of a mare, will be tried tomorrow at 9 a. m. Frank Miller and Chester Olson, charged with larceny in a dwelling, will be tried tomorrow forenoon.

This afternoon the case of state vs. Ray Clark is being tried. It is alleged that Clark swore falsely in order to secure a marriage license for a Wallawa county couple some time ago. Col. Ivanhoe is prosecuting and Cochran and Cochran are defending. The Barnes-McKennon controversy went to the jury this afternoon when Judge Knowles overruled a motion to obtain an instructed verdict in favor of the defendant.

Mrs. Walk Wins Suit.

About six hours' deliberation was required by the jury in the Mrs. A. G. Walk-C. R. Hibberd trial yesterday, to reach a verdict, which, returned about 5 o'clock last night, was in favor of the plaintiff. Mrs. Walk is awarded \$3,000 and interest by the jury verdict, the whole amount sued for. The testimony required considerably more than a day for its introduction and brought the plaintiff, J. P. Walsh and others to the stand for the plaintiff, C. R.

TURK STRONGHOLD FALLS INTO MONTENEGRIN HANDS

HARRIMAN GIFT STOPPED SUITS AGAINST ESPEE

LOVETT'S TESTIMONY DENIED AND REFUTED

FORMER GOVERNMENT OFFICIAL SAYS LOVETT FALSIFIED

After Harriman Had Contributed Large Sums to the Republican Campaign, Suits Were Dropped That Saved Millions for the Trust—More Light Thrown on Contributions in 1905.

Los Angeles, Oct. 11.—Attacking statements of Robert Lovett head of the Harriman lines, before the senate campaign contributions committee, Attorney Joseph S. Call, a former special counsel of the United States government and a supporter of Woodrow Wilson, in an interview declared that Lovett's testimony was "wholly unwarranted by the facts and untrue."

Call displayed a letter from the United States attorney general dismissing the pending suits against the Espee, aimed to prevent a merger with the Central Pacific. The letters are dated in October, 1905. Call claims the suits were dissolved after Harriman had raised \$240,000 in 1904 for the Republican campaign. It is asserted the dismissal of the suits meant millions to Harriman and his associates.

Drexel's Gifts Exposed.

Washington, Oct. 11.—E. T. Stotesbury, head of the Drexel Banking company, was on the stand in the campaign contributions probe this morning. He testified he raised \$165,795 to be used for the Pennsylvania fight in 1904, and contributed \$100,000 in 1908, and also \$25,000 to the present Republican campaign. He said his company contributed \$40,000 to Roosevelt in 1904, and the United States steel corporation gave \$12,500 and other interests \$22,000.

Frank Smith, an internal revenue collector of Springfield, Ill., and the manager of Taft's pre-convention campaign in that state, testified that he spent \$38,000 but knew of no other expenditures. He declared that he refused all contributions from federal employees.

Knox Reaches Seattle.

Retirement of Col. Fitch.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 11.—After more than 34 years' service, Lieutenant Colonel Graham D. Fitch, Corps of Engineers was placed on the army retired list today on his own application. Col. Fitch is from Illinois and was graduated from West Point in 1882. Recently he has been in charge of river and harbor works in the vicinity of Montgomery, Ala.

TURKS SUFFER SEVERE LOSSES IN HARD FIGHT

SERBIA DECLARES WAR ON TURKEY. TOO

CONFIRMED NEWS DISPATCHES TELL OF HARD BATTLE

Many Men Lost on Both Sides Say Meagre Reports From Fighting Zone Montenegrins Win Two Decisive Victories After Severe Fighting—Guerrilla Warfare Is Carried on Extensively.

Berlin, Oct. 11.—Serbia declared war against Turkey at 4 o'clock this afternoon according to an unconfirmed dispatch from Belgrade.

London, Oct. 11.—A second overwhelming victory for the Montenegrins is the occupation of Scutari, the most important stronghold of Northern Albania. This reported victory is a heavy blow to Turkey. A report from Podgoritzak, headquarters of King Nicholas of Montenegro says his forces captured Fort Dominina, and the Turkish town of Euzl, after 14 hours of terrific fighting. The loss was great on both sides.

Victories Verified Later.

Semlin, Hungary, Oct. 11.—Confirmation of the reported Montenegrin victories at Planitz and Detitch were received today. There is no verification of the report that General Martinovitch, a Montenegrin minister of war, was captured at Scutari. Guerrilla warfare is progressing on the frontier.

McCarthy and Kaufman.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 11.—Luther McCarthy, the Missouri giant and Al Kaufman, the big Californian, are to come together in Griffin's arena tomorrow afternoon for a 20-round battle. It will be the first heavyweight mill that the fight fans of this vicinity have had an opportunity to see in a long spell and it is expected there will be a big crowd at the ringside. McCarthy comes to the coast heralded as the fighter who easily disposed of Carl Morris and a number of other aspirants in the heavy division. The critics figure that he should be able to hold his own against Kaufman, who, though once hailed as the best of the white hopes, has since gone down before Jim Flynn and several others.

SETTLERS COMING HERE.

About Twenty Tourists Going Through Come Here to Investigate.

Grande Ronde valley is getting a share, though a small one maybe, of the tourists seeking homes in the Pacific Northwest. To date, in the neighborhood of 20 have deposited tickets with the local agent, indicating that that number of people, who have tickets through to the coast, are stopping off here to investigate. The number is larger this year than ever before, and that in the face of the fact that fewer tourists are seeking the Northwest during the life time of the rates. Traffic remains good but lacks the enormity of former years.

Those who have deposited tickets here, are largely still in the valley looking over various propositions.
