Fenway Park, Boston, Oct. 12.—Christy Mathewson got "his" today when Hooper and Yerkes tripled in the third inning and Doyle muffed up a clean drive. The big Giant saw his teammates beaten two to one and the Beaneaters have but to win Monday to clinch the world's series. The game today was tighter in every respect than any yet—even at that it came near not materializing as the day looked wet and rainy for a ball game. But it got started before 37,000 people and came to a speedy end.

Fine sailing prevailed for both clubs until the third inning was reached. Hooper, the Boston right fielder, lifted out a triple, and Yerkes tripled behind him, scoring Hooper. Speaker went safe on Doyle's fumble. Yerkes scoring.

New York Stops Shutout.
In the seventh inning Merkle doubled, but Herzog and Meyers went out. Merkle reaching third on the two plays. McCormick, the famous pinch hitter, batted for Fletcher at this juncture and went safe on Gardner's fumble at third. Merkle scored and McCormick gets credit for a hit. However Shaffer ran for McCormick.

It was extremely cloudy at 11 o'clock but a stiff wind drove the fog away and the umpires inspected the field after which they announced the game would be played.
The diamond at Fenway Park was in fair shape but the outfield was wet.
Boston is celebrating Columbus day and a huge crowd was present and hundred stood shivering outside the grounds, waiting for the gates to open.
The betting is ten to six that Boston wins the series.

DEFENSE SUFFERS BLOW.

Government Not Required to Surrender All Its Evidence.

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—At the trial of the 47 laborites this morning, R. J. Rutherford, a hotel man of Omaha, testified that Orde McManigal was his guest in 1910. Government detectives through the hotel employees, traced McManigal, H. S. Hocking, secretary and treasurer of the Ironworkers' association, and James B. McNamara from Toledo, Cincinnati, Utica, and Elmore.

A crushing blow was dealt the defense when Federal Judge Anderson overruled motions that the defense be allowed to inspect in advance all the government evidence and exhibits, and the government has asked the return of all documents and letters belonging to the accused men, seized last year, and the prosecution will not use the same at the present trial.

MARINE BAND ON WAY WEST

FAMOUS UNITED STATES MUSIC MAKERS HERE.

Columbus Day Scantily Observed in La Grande.

Harmonious with the day—the celebration of Christopher Columbus commemoration is officially under way today—the famous marine band of Washington, D. C., arrived in Oregon today and passed through La Grande just before noon. The band is touring the Pacific Northwest under a special dispensation. It is Uncle Sam's private band—it comes and goes at the president's behest; it marches at the head of inaugural parades, plays at functions of state, and is in many ways the most famous organization of its kind. Its full equipment is 70 pieces but only those who have been members for five years participated in this trip. The first program will be given at Pendleton.

Christopher Columbus day received scant attention in La Grande today. Circuit court recessed, the postoffice was closed this afternoon, the land office remained closed for the day. That is about all the attention the day was given. The local banks followed the practice of the banks at large throughout the state and remained open for business. At Cove, however, Cashier McCall declared a holiday and closed the doors. Suspension of circuit court was probably the most effective of all attentions to the day for it allowed jurors a return to their respective homes. Local Knights of Columbus will observe early mass in a body in accordance with the day early Sunday.

SUBWAY UNDER SECOND STREET NOW PROMISED

PROJECT TO COST OVER \$20,000 IS THE ESTIMATE

SECOND STREET PAVING TO CONFORM WITH PROPOSALS

Concrete Viaduct to Be Erected as Soon as Figures Are Completed Is Admission of Assistant General Manager of Harriman Lines—Has Been Under Discussion for Some Time.

Construction of a viaduct under the Second street crossing became an assured fact today when Assistant General Manager M. J. Buckley informed Mayor Church and members of the council that the company anticipated such action as soon as the engineer completed the plans. The project is to cost between \$22,000 and \$25,000 and will be sufficiently wide and sufficiently deep to give a clearance of more than ordinary demands. Second street paving projects will be made to jibe with the new plan and will take a gradual grade to get down to a point where all vehicles can pass under the tracks. The Second street crossing always has and always will be dangerous unless remedied as there is so much switching at that point. All the tracks in the yard, practically, head in near the Second street crossing and a subway will not only expedite the switching for the company but will permit traffic to pass at any time without danger or hindrance. The subway will be wide, built of concrete and sufficiently high to permit ordinary traffic, loads of hay and the like to pass under readily.

Mr. Buckley affirmed that construction would commence as soon as the plans were drawn, a portion of which have already been outlined.

That it will necessitate retaining walls of property abutting the railroad right of way is a minor consideration as the public in general will benefit greatly by the project. The scheme has been under consideration for some time and it appears now that it is a certainty. Just when it will be built depends upon the weather; sudden freezing cold will probably defer the work until spring. In the meantime, if the contracts can be filed, paving will be done to a point near the tracks where the grade would incline downward and then halted until the subway is finished.

VANCOUVER IS SAFE.

General Wood Declares Army Post Is to Remain Where It Is.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 12.—Utter claptrap and nonsense is the way Major General Leonard Wood characterizes the talk of the army's intention to abandon the Vancouver barracks, in an interview today. "It is not under consideration and never has been," continued General Wood.

Dressed in civilian's clothes he arrived at six o'clock this morning and will probably stay until Tuesday. This is his first visit here since 1899. "I have not recommended that the Puget Sound be made a point of concentration for the troops in the northwest," he declared, "and nobody knows what will be done in this regard."

ALARM EQUIPMENT HERE.

Installation to Commence Next Week Says Word From Company

A greater portion of the new automatic fire alarm system which is to be installed in this city, has been received here and the balance is on the way.

R. L. Lincoln, chairman of the Fire and Police committee has received information to the effect that the installer will leave Seattle Sunday for La Grande to complete the job of putting it in working order.

Darrow Trial Postponed.

Los Angeles, Oct. 12.—An agreement was reached today where the second trial of Clarence Darrow is postponed from October 11 to November 20th. Acting Presiding Judge Norton agreed to the postponement with Judge Conley Madera, deputized by Governor Johnson to sit in the case. "We need rest before the trial," is the statement of Earl Rogers, of the Darrow counsel.

DARDANELLES MAY SEE SHIP OF FOE SOON

ITALIANS ARE SAID TO HAVE RE-DECLARED WAR

ALL EUROPE FEARS CONSEQUENCE OF THE RUMORS

Italian Ships Said to Be Planning Trip Through Dardanelles to Capture Constantinople—Balkans Would Immediately Fall Upon Turks, It Is Feared—Slaughter Continues.

Paris, Oct. 12.—Great alarm prevails over the reports that peace negotiations between Italy and Turkey have failed and that the Italian fleet is to attempt a passage of the Dardanelles and capture Constantinople. The passage is heavily mined. Diplomats fear an invasion of Turkey by the Balkans should Italy succeed.

Butchering Tactics Continue.

Vienna, Oct. 12.—Heavy fighting between Turks and Montenegrins is in progress about Scutari. The Turks seek to hold the town pending reinforcements. Turkish accounts state that the Montenegrins are burning Albanian villages and butchering by the scores.

Bond Issue Hangs Fire

IMBLER TAXPAYERS TO BRING COURT ACTION.

MINUTES DISPUTED

Bond Buyers Said to Have Had a Man At Meeting Taking Minutes.

An interesting case was filed yesterday afternoon in the circuit court wherein the taxpayers of Imbler school district are bringing suit to annul a bond issue of \$20,000 issued some time back.

The complaint claims that Keeler Bros. to whom the bonds were sold, had a representative here, Mr. Keeler, who wrote up what was purported to be the minutes of the meeting when the bonds were voted; that minutes were kept by others at the meeting, and that the Keeler minutes are misleading and do not state the facts as to what occurred at the meeting. On the strength of the Keeler minutes, it is claimed the bonds were issued and sold and Keeler Bros. were the purchasers. The bonds are for twenty years, and the minutes kept by someone else than Keeler claim it was the will of the meeting for the bonds to run but for five years.

Had the bonds been issued under the minutes now alleged to be correct, they would have come under one section of the law, whereas the bonds that were issued under the Keeler minutes necessarily come under an entirely different section.

For these reasons a number of taxpayers of Imbler school district have employed George T. Cochran and C. H. Finn and will fight the bond issue, asking the court to nullify the whole proceeding.

HUNTINGTON STIRRED AGAIN

SHIFTING OF MAYORS HARRASSES FINANCE.

Town Said to Be Wide Open Again and Finances Badly Depleted.

Huntington, Oct. 11.—(Special)—This city is prolific in mayoralty timber, having had three in less than nine months. First came Mayor Northey who resigned after a short term at the request of Governor West. He was followed by J. T. Fyfe, a pioneer business man, who found that a few weeks in office was sufficient satisfaction. He has been succeeded by J. S. Crimins, the barber, who was elected by the council last night. He resigned as councilman to accept the mayor's chair. His place as councilman was filled by Mr. Freelove of the Mack Drug company.

The changes in the personnel of the council bring no changes in the policy of the city officials. Mr. Crimins, it is said, stands for a wide open town. It appears to many that the situation for the city is becoming very serious. It is understood that when the new administration took charge after the last election there were ample funds in the treasury to carry on the work of the city and meet every obligation. This has practically been dissipated, it is alleged, until today there is not a dollar to the credit of the city and it is heavily in debt. The city is now unable to meet even the current salary expenses of the water commissioner, marshal and other city officers.

Mr. Fyfe was importuned to sign warrants during his term of office when there were no funds to meet them. He refused to do so. It is presumed that warrants will now be issued irrespective of the means at the disposal of the city to meet its obligations.

Apparently the city government is facing a crisis. Loud and persistent rumors are being circulated regarding the financial affairs of the city and how they have been handled. There are those who are determined on what they call a "show down," and a full examination of the financial affairs of the city government during the last two years.

BARNES WINS CASE.

Horses, Buggy and Harness and \$74.00 Damage Money Is Verdict.

After returning an irregular verdict last evening, the Barnes-McKennon jury brought in a verdict giving a span of horses, a buggy and harness—the amounts sued for—and \$74 damage money to the plaintiff. The Clark case will come up again Monday when court resumes.

"BALD JACK" ON STAND RELATES TALE OF GRAFT

RELATIONS BETWEEN GAMBLERS AND BECKER SEEN

BECKER'S STARES MAKE EX-ASSASSIN TREMBLE

Story of Becker's Dealings With Gambling Houses in New York Are Related to Jury Today With "Bald Jack" Rose on the Stand—Becker Staked Rosenthal to First "Joint."

New York, Oct. 12.—Eyes twitching and knees shaking "Bald Jack" Rose testified in the Becker trial this morning that Lieutenant Becker advanced Rosenthal \$1,500 to open a gambling dive with Becker as a partner and Rose in charge. The witness swore Becker later demanded he secure \$500 from Rosenthal to pay Charles Tripp, Becker's supposed press agent. Rose refused and Becker said the place would be raided. Becker stared ceaselessly at Rose, unnerving the witness.

Early Acquaintances Cited.

Rose testified that he first met Becker in August, 1911, when the defendant raided the witness's dive. He became "chummy," he said, and the witness agreed to collect tribute money for Becker. The other gambler, Rosenthal, Becker first met, he said last New Year, when the lieutenant dined as a guest at the Rosenthal home. That time Mrs. Rosenthal remarked that she and her husband were hard up. Becker told them to cheer up and later advanced Rosenthal the coin to open a dive.

The witness declared Becker said he must raid the place to keep in good standing with Waldo. The place was raided and two arrested. The next morning, Becker said, "Rosenthal will make it all right with you, and the men will be released."

Police Hound Rosenthal.

The witness said that Becker then withdrew his partnership in the dive, and stationed a policeman there, paralyzing Rosenthal's business. Rosenthal became desperate and threatened to tell the district attorney about Becker's connection with the place.

"Becker told me," the witness said, "that Rosenthal must be stopped. Tell Seelig and his friends they had better get Rosenthal out of the way." He said he told Becker that Rosenthal ought to be silenced and Becker replied that Rosenthal must die; Seelig's men could slay him.

Rose Protests "Croaking."

Rose swore he protested against the murder of Rosenthal. "I want him croaked," were the exact words, the witness swore, that Becker used. "We will take care of the men who do the job. Sentiment at police headquarters is such they would gladly give a medal to the man game enough to croak Rosenthal. Here is a hundred dollars to give Zelig. Tell him I want Rosenthal stopped for his benefit."

Reluctant Men Spurred.

Zelig was advised and demurred, but Becker sent him another "warning" through Rose. "Lettie Louie" Rosenthal and "Whitie" Lewis, the witness said, were told that unless Rosenthal was killed soon, both would be sent "over the river" for carrying concealed weapons. Then the gang of men agreed to dispose of Rosenthal.

Rose then told of the night of the murder, saying that Rosenthal intended to tell the district attorney all that the gang men "must act quick." The witness said he met Becker, Valon Rosenberg, Lewis and "Gyp the Blood" Becker put Webber in charge of the murderers. "Baldy" swore he did not see the actual slaying but hearing the gambler was dead, telephoned to Becker. The latter already knew of the murder. Rose testified he met Becker after the murder and asked if he had seen the body. "Yes," Becker answered, "and it was a pleasant sight. If District Attorney Whitman had not been there, I would have reached over and torn his heart out."

OFFICIALS IN CITY.

General Manager, Assistant and Superintendent Come to City.

Vice President and General Manager J. P. O'Brien of the Harriman lines in Oregon, M. J. Buckley, assistant general manager, and William Bollons, superintendent, each in his private car, were in La Grande this morning on an inspection tour. They went over the branch line this morning and will return this evening.
