Home-coming for Miss Felice Lyne, friend of many La Grande people after a winter's stay here, in Kansas City Monday night, was a stupendous success, musically, socially and financially. The audience poured \$10,000 in the theatre box office and came away immensely satisfied with the mere slip of a girl—as Kansas City knew Miss Lyne just a few years ago. The Kansas City Times, a copy of which has just been received here, deals, by the column, with the big event. The Times remarks that four or five years ago she was a school girl there, and then went away to train her voice. "We have all read of her wonderful jump to fame in a night because she pleased a critical London audience at her debut," says the Times. "Yet only last night we heard her real voice." The Times critic goes on to say: "When the little prima donna appeared on the concert stage last night, it could not have taken two looks to see that she has not been 'spoiled' (reference being previously made to her unattained praise by Europe's royalty) and that she had not been dizzy on her passage to the heights."

She sang "Caro Nome" as her first number, as she did that night in London and in describing the manner in which she handled it and the subsequent numbers, the Times devotes a column or more, of the warmest kind of praise.
