Frank Chance mixes with his men around the different cities and bullies them in a jovial, playful fashion.

Hank O'Day's years of umpiring spoiled his managerial chances. For many seasons he had held aloof from all players, as is the umpire's law. He had grown reserved, close mouthed, accustomed to herding by himself. When he took command of the Reds he honestly tried to come out of the shell and mix. He couldn't. For a little time he went around with the boys, took in picture shows with them, tried to get sociable. No use. You can't break the habits of a dozen years in a few days. What's more, the players could not go halfway to meet him. Instinctively they had grown accustomed to Umpire O'Day, the common enemy. They couldn't seem to get friendly with Manager O'Day, their new director.

Ere long Hank resumed the iron shell he wore so long as an umpire, the players stood away from him just as they did when he was making the decisions, and Henry O'Day became a solitary being. That's what umpiring will do to a man. In Chicago, before he took on the umpire job, Hank was a ward politician, and a good one too. A ward politician has to be a mixer, and Hank twenty years ago was a mixer from Mingerville. Umpiring ruined all the sociability and converted Henry into a silent sphinx without talk or jollity. At heart Hank is a grand old boy, worthy of high respect a man who, once really understood, is liked and respected forever. But umpiring erases the best of 'em, and it can't be helped. One thing sure—it will be quite a while before any manager asks another umpire to manage his ball club.
