NEW MESSAGE PULPIT DUTY

WRITER FINDS PEOPLE CAN'T BE SCARED

Ministry Must Bring Message That Is Is Something New in It.

La Grande, Oct. 15.—To the Editor: The question has often been asked why the ministry does not reach the masses. I use the word ministry, because men do not find fault with the church as a rule, but with the pastor, for not having a message that will reach the multitude. The day when you can force people to fill the pews by preaching hell, fire and brimstone has passed away. They cannot be frightened; you must have a message. Cut and dried dogma will not do. Make the lives of men worth while; and the future, they feel, will take care of itself.

It has remained for Rev. Fyke and a few like him throughout the length and breadth of the land to note this need. The local M. E. church on S. Fourth street was packed Sunday night by a spell bound audience as the pastor told the simple story of 'Enoch Arden, a Hero.' Mr. Fyke said in part:

"The days of hero worship have not passed.

"English literature, American literature, in fact, all literature owes a debt to Christianity that it can never pay. Take Jean Valjean out of 'Les Miserables' and Victor Hugo's immortal work would collapse; take the Christian idea out of 'Enoch Arden' and you would take out all the pathos and dry up all the tears."

Mr. Fyke differentiated between the hero of the past and prior to the Christian era and the hero of the present. He told the story of Achilles and his compatriots of the Trojan war. They were heroes because of their selfishness; Enoch Arden was a hero because of his unselfishness.

Proceeding, Mr. Fyke pictured the environments of Annie Lee, Enoch Arden and Philip—the home by the restless ocean, the mill with its industry, the old moss covered church. Alongside of these places the little red school house and you have the basic principles of civilization.

The story of "Enoch Arden" is a comedy and yet a tragedy, bloodless and without a villain and yet leaving all the heart aches and heart breaks. CARL G. GRIMM.
