To Try Woman for 7-Year-Old Murder

Augusta Me., Oct. 15.—Mrs. Elsie Hobbs Raymond of Poland, who has been confined in the jail here since she was indicted for murder last April, will probably be tried at the term of the Kennebec county court that convened today. The case is one of the most notable in the criminal annals of Maine. Mrs. Raymond is accused of the murder of Mattie Hackett, a young girl of Readfield, who was called from her home by an unknown person on the evening of August 17, 1905, and strangled to death in a thicket near by. Suspicion soon fell upon Mrs. Raymond, an acquaintance of the murdered girl, who was believed to have been jealous of her. Mrs. Raymond and her husband gave an account of the crime which established an alibi that the state could not find evidence enough at the time to destroy. Last spring, however, the prosecuting attorney presented newly discovered evidence to the grand jury, with the result that Mrs. Raymond was indicted on a charge of murder in the first degree.

ENJOY FEAST

NEW GRILL AT FOLEY HOTEL IS
ANIMATED SCENE.

Speeches, Song and Music Make a
Sparkling Social Function.

Last night the Foley grill was a lively, sparkling place where an orchestra sent its strains of music over a large number of representative citizens who had gathered in honor of the installation of the night grill service which marks an epoch in La Grande's history.

When so many attended the opening night the grill room was voluntarily turned into a social gathering and for several hours the diners enjoyed themselves in speech making, conversation and listening to the music.

Among the speakers was J. J. Carr whose talk was decidedly interesting for he reviewed the growth of La Grande. He was born in this valley in 1876 and told how as a "kid," he remembered this city when only Mr. Grandy's house marked the townsite; how as the village grew Jerry Foley erected the present Foley hotel, and how people would come here from all over the valley to watch the work on the three story building. He closed his remarks by paying a tribute to the enterprise of Mr. Foley and assured P. A. Foley, the present proprietor, that it was his belief that city and community would appreciate the night grill service just being installed.

J. T. Scroggin, cashier of the United States National Bank, F. L. Meyers, cashier of the La Grande National Bank, Mayor W. J. Church, Ellis Kirtley, Norman Desilet and Jay Van Burien all responded to toasts and in a happy manner hurled the good luck horseshoe for the new service. Mrs. T. N. Murphy and Mrs. Scroggin responded for the ladies in neat speeches, assuring the grill management of the appreciation that would come from the ladies of La Grande.

Feeling that the occasion would not have been complete without a word from the man who pioneered the hotel business in La Grande unanimous request caused Jerry Foley to address the diners. As he arose the song, "He Is a Jolly Good Fellow" was sung with considerable force. Mr. Foley reviewed his life in this city as it had pertained to the building line. He called attention to the present Foley hotel and said that when it was built it was the largest and best hotel between Portland and Salt Lake. It was the only hotel between those two points then that had steam heat and private bath. "Now," he continued, "the building has been overshadowed by other cities and it is not up to the minute."

While there was no statement by either Mr. Foley or his son last evening regarding a new hotel for La Grande, the general belief is that within a very few years they contemplate erecting a new building on the present hotel site.

Near the midnight hour the diners at the grill sang a parting song and with many compliments to the management on the splendid opening departed.

Died in Los Angeles.

John T. Williamson is in receipt of word from Los Angeles that Herbert Wilkinson, known here as "Bert" Wilkinson, died at his home in that city last Saturday. Burial was made there. A message was also received from Mrs. Williamson, who is visiting at Wenatchee, stating that it was impossible for her to reach Los Angeles in time to attend the funeral of her brother.

Herbert Wilkinson was about forty years of age. He was raised in the Grande Ronde valley and all of the old settlers remember him very well.
