FRIDAY WILL BRING CRISIS

ROOSEVELT'S CONDITION IS UNCHANGED TODAY

FRANK JAMES WOULD FORM A BODYGUARD FOR COLONEL

Condition of the Colonel Good This Morning—Bulletins Show That Crisis Will Arrive Tomorrow—Many Continue to Send Telegrams of Sympathy to the Stricken Family.

Chicago, Oct. 16.—A crisis in the condition of Colonel Roosevelt will come Friday, according to Dr. Scurry Terrell, who, in a statement, says: "If there is danger of blood poisoning tetanus will be indicated Friday. If there is no pus present Friday the colonel will recover rapidly. Nothing indicates an unfavorable turn."

When Roosevelt awoke this morning he inquired for Mrs. Roosevelt and his family. He ate a big breakfast. Telegrams and messages are pouring in at the rate of 100 an hour. The colonel wants to invite everybody to his room and talk politics, but the doctors have a hard time keeping him quiet.

Roosevelt shows nothing but impatience toward Schrank, according to his cousin, Phillip Roosevelt. The colonel is not angry at his assailant. Dr. John Benjamin Murphy, associated with Terrell, agrees with the latter's diagnosis of the wound. "His condition is excellent," declares Murphy.

The following bulletin was issued by the Roosevelt physicians at 9:20 this morning:

"Records show that Roosevelt had a good night; his temperature and pulse normal, and the highest pulse since 9 o'clock last night was 80, the highest temperature 98.8, respiration 20. He has less irritation from the injured rib and did not need anodyne for the pain. The general condition of Mr. Roosevelt is excellent."

It is announced that he will be able to leave the hospital in ten days, providing there are no complications. Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Theodore, Jr., Ethel and Dr. Lambert, arrived this morning and hurried to the hospital, where they were admitted to the colonel's room without delay. They reached the hospital at 9:30, Mrs. Longworth meeting the party at Englewood. The family was closeted alone with the colonel.

King George of England cabled Mrs. Roosevelt this morning as follows: "I am much concerned to hear of the dastardly attack on Colonel Roosevelt, and I trust he will speedily recover."

King Alfonso of Spain cabled a note of sympathy to the colonel, who said he felt "bully."

James Wood Guard Colonel. Frank James, a brother of Jesse, the famous bandit, this morning offered to pay the expenses of a bodyguard of 100 for Roosevelt until the election James to be a member of the guard.

Dr. Woods Hutchinson, a Bull Moose, and a noted physician, visited the colonel this morning. Doctor Murphy, Lambert and Hutchinson agreed that the colonel's life was saved by the steel spectacle case.

Elbert Martin, secretary of Roosevelt, is intercepting all packages addressed to the colonel, containing eatables. Authorities at the Mercy hospital are refusing all other delicacies.

TWO FREED BY GRAND JURORS

HUFFMAN AND THATCHER ARE EXONERATED.

Grand Jury Returns Several True Bills This Morning.

Another batch of indictments and two not true bills were returned by the grand jury this morning, and the end is not yet. Those to be exonerated were Walter Huffman, accused of assault with a dangerous weapon, and Claude Thatcher accused of obtaining money under false pretenses. The true bills are still secret.

The case of two North Powder merchants, Forsstrom and Huddelson, continues to hold the attention of circuit court today. The defense has its inning and the end will probably come this evening some time.

Mrs. Roosevelt has received messages of sympathy from Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, Cardinal Gibbons and Lord Curzon, the former British viceroy of India.

Late Bulletin Issues.

Physicians issued this bulletin at 1:30: "The patient's temperature throughout the morning was 98.6; the pulse 90, breathing much easier and general condition excellent."

At 11 o'clock Mrs. Roosevelt was still at the colonel's bedside, but Mrs. Longworth and Ethel autoed about the city.

WEAK MINDS TRAIT OF THE SCHRANK CLAN

NEW YORK ACQUAINTANCES OF ASSASSIN TELL FACTS

GERMAN ARMY BOOKS LIST HIM AS A DESERTER

John Schrank Brought to America by Uncle and Aunt and Lost a Small Fortune Two Years Ago—He Threatened to Shoot Judge Presiding at a Recent Law Suit in Which He Lost.

New York, Oct. 16.—With an unusually heavy bodyguard, as a result of the Roosevelt attack, President Taft started for Beverly this morning

New York, Oct. 16.—Alarmed over the shooting of Roosevelt, and fearing a fanatic may shoot the Democratic nominee, McAdoo, vice chairman of the Democratic national committee today confirmed the report that Wilson's campaign dates were cancelled, but the one last engagement at Madison Square Oct. 21st.

New York, Oct. 16.—Old acquaintances of John Schrank who attempted to kill Roosevelt, say there has been insanity in three generations of the Schrank family.

Dominick and Anna Flammang, an uncle and aunt, brought him to America in 1883. He was called John Flammang until his uncle gave him a saloon, and then he used his own name. In 1911 his uncle died, leaving Schrank \$25,000. Last February he lost his money and secured a job. He lost a law suit to recover the money and threatened the life of the judge.

Schrank Legally Sane.

Milwaukee, Oct. 16.—"John Schrank is legally sane," is the statement of District Attorney Zabel.

"He realizes he has committed an illegal act. From a medical standpoint he may have a slight aberration."

A chemical analysis of the remaining bullets in Schrank's revolver was ordered to detect possible poison, but the analysis shows there is no poison in the remaining bullets.

Schrank a Deserter.

Munich, Bavaria, Oct. 16.—Military authorities announced today that John Schrank, the attempted slayer of Colonel Roosevelt, failed to serve the required enlistment in the German army. His name appears as a deserter.

TURKISH FLEET READY.

War Will Be Declared Immediately if Ultimatum Is Denied.

Constantinople, Oct. 16.—Warships are being held in readiness here to sail at a moment's notice. The probable destination is not announced.

Vienna, Oct. 16.—That the Montenegrin advance on Albania is checked is announced today in dispatches from Constantinople but contradictory dispatches from Cetinje, states that the Montenegrins are victorious and the latter version is accepted here. The Turkish ministers have left Greece, Bulgaria and Serbia without passports.

Belgrade, Serbia, Oct. 16.—Bulgaria, Serbia and Greece today are drafting a joint ultimatum to Turkey and war will be declared immediately unless the sultan yields to demands.

GIRL KNOCKED DOWN BY RUFFIAN AS SHE STARTS FOR WELL IN DARKNESS

Miss Ina Delellies, aged 16, was knocked down and unconscious by a ruffian who dealt the blow from a secluded corner, as the young lady was stepping from the rear door of her sister's home at 1805 U avenue, last night. While the blow and the nervous shock left the victim a nervous wreck for a time, after she regained consciousness, she is mostly over all consequences of the incident today. Miss Delellies was leaving the kitchen with a water bucket to fetch some water and the moment she set foot on the bottom stair, she was struck from behind with the man's fist probably, the blow striking her over the kidneys. She fell unconscious and the noise of the falling body and the bucket drew the attention of Mrs. John E. Nelson, at whose home Miss Delellies lives. The ruffian was gone.

Motive Mysterious.

The injured girl was removed to the house and speedily gave signs of recovery. The motive is something of

a mystery. A few articles were taken from the cellar last night and whether or not the ruffian stood guard at the kitchen door while a pal pilfered the cellar, is not known but is a plausible deduction. Another conclusion is that a local man who made ungentlemanly advances on the street to the young lady a few days ago and was roundly slapped and cuffed for his efforts by persons with Miss Delellies, may have been hanging around the premises awaiting an opportunity to obtain revenge. Officer Avant was called and given all the clues in the case last evening, but they are meagre.

Roughs Visit City.

Chief of Police McLachlen today asserted that the police department is kept busy trailing undesirable characters who are in the city. A band of three was chased out of town last night and others are still here.

Caution is necessary, advises the chief, by people who have a habit of leaving doors and windows unfastened.

TEACHERS HIE TO ENTERPRISE

FIRST DAY'S PROGRAM SET FOR TODAY.

Full Strength of 125 Leave Union Co. Alone on Special.

Enterprise, Ore., Oct. 16.—All the branches of educational activity, from the district school to the university, were represented in the attendance here today at the opening of the annual convention of the Eastern Oregon Teachers' Association. Morning and afternoon sessions were held, the programme including addresses by Professor Grant Smith of Chicago, Professor Joseph Schafer of the University of Oregon, and L. R. Alderman, State Superintendent of public instruction. The meeting will continue over tomorrow and Friday.

Scarcely a teacher of high school or grade remains in Union county today. The full strength of 125 left Union county borders this morning on a special train leaving here at 8 and augmented in numbers by the several counties west of the mountains, and by a special trainload from Baker and Eastern Union county. The Baker special arrived at 8 o'clock. All the heads of city schools and rural schools are in Enterprise, for to stay away subjects the teacher to abrogation of his teaching contract—unless absence is for good cause. The program this year promises to be exceptionally good and the many La Grande people in attendance are enthusiastic over the schedule of events.

JOHN COLLIER MAYOR TIMBER

CIRCULATION OF PETITIONS FOR HIM NOW ON.

Urgent Requests Hurdled at the Prominent Merchant.

Mayorality politics took on definite shape today when John Collier, general manager of the People's store, prominent in city civic circles and for long connected with the La Grande commercial club, consented to let his name go on the ticket, for the office of mayor. Urgent pressure has been brought to bear on Mr. Collier to say the word for several days and he has finally agreed to become a candidate. Petitions are being circulated today to put him on the ticket. Further mayoralty candidates are keeping in the dark, though there is still plenty of time. Upon whom the task of carrying the Socialist party will fall is not made public, even if the Socialists themselves have agreed upon it, but that there will be but few men in the race is the rumor now afloat.

INVESTIGATING VIADUCT PLAN.

Engineer Brandon Here to Personally Inspect the New Project.

To gain first hand information about the conditions that must be met in an engineering viewpoint, H. A. Brandon, chief of engineers for the O.W., is in La Grande today. He held consultations with the street committee of the council, the mayor and local officials. He has not yet gained sufficient information about the proposed project to pass judgment on the plan or to say when it can be commenced.

Boston four, New York three, one game tied. Boston is world's champion.

Fenway Park, Boston, Oct. 16.—Wreaths of the mighty were hung upon the Boston Red Sox this afternoon in a game that required ten innings to decide—and it decided the world championship series and decided the greatest series in history. Boston won three-two in the tenth inning by Gardner's sacrifice fly that settled the business.

Today was the coldest of the season. Hundreds shivered outside of Fenway park to await the opening of the gates for the last world's series game. Joe Wood begged Stahl for another chance.

The Boston fans were sore at the club management because the regular seats of the "royal rooters" were not held yesterday.

Dissension prevails among the Sox. Two Boston twirlers had a red hot fight after the last game, and two catchers joined in. One pitcher called the other "a bonehead" and was knocked cold. It was verified today that Wood and O'Brien were the pitchers who "mixed" yesterday evening.

Nervousness Apparent.

The Red Sox appeared on the field first, one by one, and the Giants appeared in a body, chanting "Tessie." The Boston rooters' battle was then on. They worked steadily and grimly. Boston plainly displayed a nervous strain.

Mathewson, Bedient Start.

Christy Mathewson and Bedient were the men who started the telling game—and Mathewson finished. New York scored early, in the third, when Devore walked and took second on Doyle's out. Murray doubled—several for him of this sort—and Devore scored. Bedient settled down and went like clockwork from then on but Stahl saw him weakening in the seventh and pulled him out.

Boston was as helpless as New York until the seventh when Gardner went out, Stahl singled, and Wagner walked. Cady flied out and Hendrickson, a pinch hitter, batted for Bedient and doubled, scoring Stahl.

Wood was called in from the bench, to which he was sent in defeat yesterday, and took the game a tie and therefore gets credit for winning three of the games won by the Red Sox, and losing one.

Both Score in Tenth.

New York made a grand effort to break up the game in the tenth but scored one run only while Boston got
