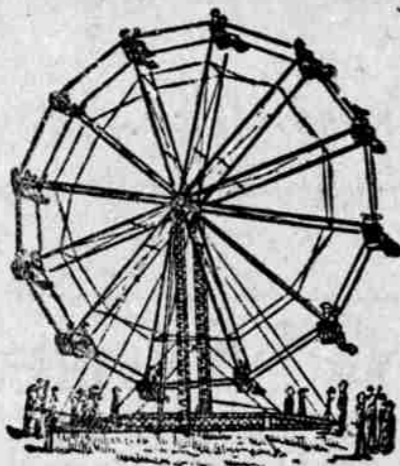

At the same time he has driven home without preaching or moralizing the fact of the menace which lies in the abuse of capital and oftentimes fearful results upon those who misuse it, and those who oppose its misuse.

In the plot for a story Mr. Klein has taken a judge who, after long and faithful service on the bench, has been impoverished, his honesty questioned and his position placed in jeopardy, from having handed down a decision unfavorable to the great amalgamated interests of John Burkett Ryder and his fellows. His uprightness, a thorn in the side of the capitalists, induces them to resort to a scheme to dishonor and depose him. The daughter of the judge returns from Europe just as the blow falls, and, finding her father disgraced and in poverty, takes the matter into her own hands.

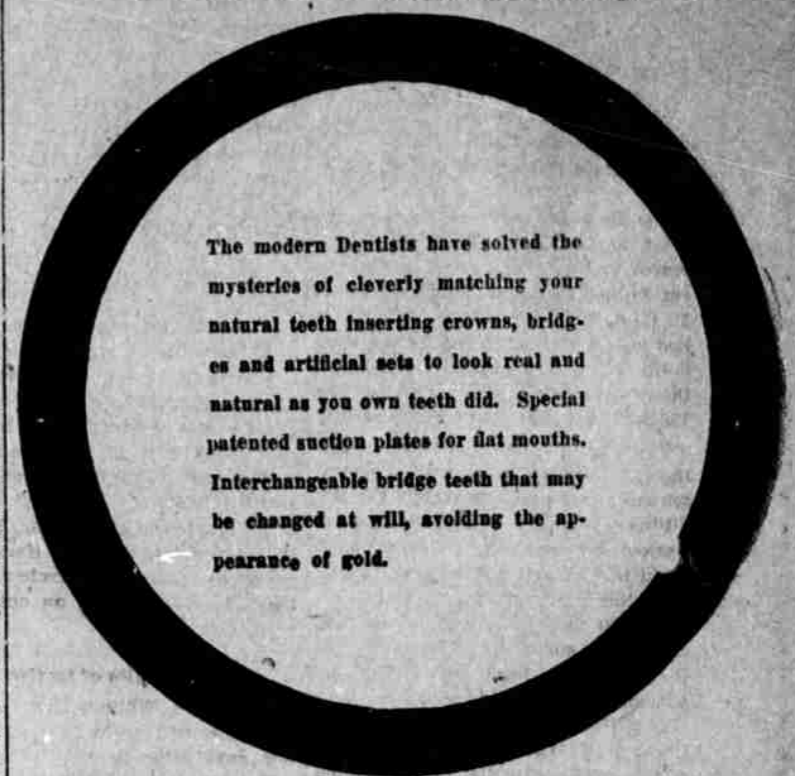
Miss Green, who, of course, is Shirley Rossmore, enters and there follows a remarkably stimulating encounter between her and Ryder. Delighted with her frankness and cleverness he asks her to write his biography and puts her in possession of secret documents from which to get the date. After being one of the members of his household for a considerable length of time, the master's subjugation to her cleverness and wit is so complete, that he asks her to marry his son in order to keep him out of the clutches of the daughter of the hated Rossmores. Her keen sense of womanhood and her love for Jefferson will not allow her to further deceive those who have shown her personal kindness and thereupon she admits her identity as being the real Miss Rossmore.

Outwitted and cheated in his fondest hopes Ryder in a fit of exasperation, orders her from his house, whereupon the son Jefferson interferes, telling his father his determination to leave with her and become her husband. Here Shirley's pride interferes and she denounces Ryder, Sr., assuring him that she would not allow herself to fall so low as to marry the son of a man who tramples all good under his golden heel and who refuses to lift his hand to save her father from unmerited disgrace. This scene has been unanimously conceded by all critics to be one of the very best introduced in a drama of recent years. Even the success of the play of which everyone is familiar is reason sufficient that all classes of theatre-goers should not fail to see it.

**A Few Reasons Why a Patriotic Citizen
Should Not Vote For Jonathan Bourne.**

COLONEL ROOSEVELT AND BOURNE.

When Colonel Roosevelt, as president of the United States, wrote the kind of letters that are herewith reprinted you may be sure there was ample cause for his action. After reading the letters, it is hard for you to come to any other conclusion than that Oregon's senior senator, Jonathan Bourne, was thoroughly identified with the Standard Oil and that he was attempting to intercede for the Standard Oil company with the president at that time. Please note the tone of Colonel Roosevelt's words to this man who has pretended to represent Oregon in the United States senate:

"Sagamore Hill, Feb. 2, 1908.—My Dear Senator: I am sorry I could not see you today, but I do not like to see anyone on Sunday on business if it can be avoided.

"As to what you told me the other evening about the Standard Oil people, do remember that, while any proposals they make will be considered in an entirely frank and honorable spirit yet these proposals must be conditioned upon absolute obedience to the law and must be laid in detail before the attorney-general and Frank B. Kellogg before it would be possible for me to express any opinion on them. I know you understand this, but I want you to be sure that the Standard Oil people do not misunderstand it and do not get the impression that it was my desire or by my initiative that negotiations have been entered into with them by you or by anyone, or that there will be any failures to lay the matter in full detail before Mr. Bonaparte and Mr. Kellogg. With regards, believe me, sincerely yours,
"THEODORE ROOSEVELT."

"Oyster Bay, N. Y., July 3, 1908.—My Dear Senator: Mr. Loeb has transmitted to me your telephone message as to Mr. Kellogg submitting a written memorandum. My dear senator, let me repeat in writing what I have said again and again to Mr. Archbold and to you and what I stated at much length in our interview of last Monday. In my judgment, it is not only a waste of time, but inadvisable to try to carry on negotiations through you as intermediary.

"Let the Standard Oil lawyers, any or all of them as Mr. Archbold or Mr. Rockefeller or anyone else may choose, decide as to the course they wish to

follow, and then communicate direct to Mr. Kellogg or the attorney-general. I read you what Mr. Bonaparte wrote me, which I had previously read to Mr. Kellogg, and I furnished you with a copy of it. You now inform Mr. Loeb that this is not specific enough. It was not meant to be specific. It was not meant to show you. It was meant by Mr. Bonaparte to advise me as to what he and Mr. Kellogg thought was the proper course to follow. I read it to you so that you might understand what the attitude of the department of justice was, and when I read it to you I explained explicitly to Mr. Archbold and yourself what I have now put in writing above, namely, that it is undesirable to attempt to carry out negotiations through you, and that the proper person for you to communicate with was not me, but Mr. Bonaparte or Mr. Kellogg. Then an appeal can always be made to me; but obviously the first thing to do is to have the counsel of the Standard Oil communicate with the counsel of the department of justice, Mr. Kellogg, or with Mr. Bonaparte himself.
