Peggy Stewart Day Observed.

Baltimore Md., Oct. 19.—"Peggy Stewart day", one of the most picturesque anniversaries in the history of Maryland, was observed today by the different historical societies of Maryland. The Peggy Stewart was a brig, which, October 15, 1774, arrived in the harbor of Annapolis from England with an assorted cargo, in which were seventeen cases of tea. At the time the people were greatly incensed over the action of England in imposing a duty on tea imported into the colonies. Anthony Stewart, owner of the brig, willingly paid the duty on the tea in order to land the rest of the cargo. The colonists were indignant at what they considered not only treason, but defiance. A mob was soon formed, but before any action was taken the thoroughly frightened Stewart, fearing personal violence, offered to burn his vessel and destroy her cargo. The offer was accepted and Stewart applied the torch to his ship, which was burned to the water's edge in the presence of a great crowd of cheering spectators.

Minnesota Remembers Gov. Johnson

St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 19.—Minnesota today paid tribute to the memory of one of her favorite sons, the late Governor John A. Johnson, by unveiling a handsome memorial by Andrew O'Connor, the New York sculptor. The statue is of bronze and is mounted on a large granite pedestal.

The unveiling exercises were held in front of the state capitol. C. D. O'Brien, president of the monument commission, presided. Bishop Lawler offered an invocation and Governor Eberhart accepted the statue in behalf of the state. Congressman Winfield S. Hammond delivered the oration of the day.

Among those in attendance at the exercises were the widow of Governor Johnson, the members of the memorial commission, the mayors of many of the leading cities of Minnesota, justices of the state supreme court and many other persons who were intimately associated with Governor Johnson in public and private life.

Honors for Rabbi Krauskopf.

Philadelphia Pa., Oct. 19.—Special services were held at the Broad street Temple today in celebration of the Rev. Dr. Joseph Krauskopf's twenty-fifth anniversary as rabbi of Kenesseth Israel Congregation. Rabbi Krauskopf is one of the foremost Jewish scholars of America. Born in Prussia in 1858, he came to America at the age of 14 and for a time was employed in the mills at Fall River. He graduated from Hebrew Union College in 1883 and held the pastorate in Kansas City before coming to Philadelphia in 1887. He was widely known as the founder of the National Farm school, in which Jewish boys are trained in practical and scientific agriculture.

NOTES FROM THE LABOR WORLD

About eight million men are employed in regular occupations in Great Britain.

Canada has nearly 133,000 unionists. All of the workmen employed in the Fore River (Mass.) ship yards will go on an eight hour basis November 4.

Seventy schools in horseshoeing, with courses ranging from one to six months, are maintained at public expense in Germany.

All unions attached to the Ohio State Federation of Labor have received notification that he annual convention meets in Canton this week.

The American Federation of Musicians has at present a cash balance of \$39,000 in its treasury, and 588 locals on its roster, all in good standing.

The Sheep Herders' Union of Butte, Mont., is sending out an appeal for moral and financial assistance in the work of organizing the sheep herders of the country.

The call has been issued for the 32d annual convention of the American Federation of Labor, to be held at Rochester, N. Y., beginning Monday morning, November 11, 1912.

Decorators (Ill.) colored women, wives of union men, have organized an independent women's union label league. So far as is known this is the first auxiliary of colored women in the country.

During the six months ending June 30, 1912, the Brotherhood of Painters 10, 1912, the Brotherhood of Painters and Decorators organized 48 new local unions, the organization now having 914 local unions in good standing.

Fargo, N. D., Trades and Labor Assembly has lost its A. F. of L. charter because of its refusal to unseat a rival union of electricians. It is said similar action is contemplated in several Minnesota towns.

The British Socialist party, in conjunction with the British syndicalist movement, headed by Tom Mann, is now engaged in arranging protest meetings and raising funds for the defense of Ettor and Giovannitti.

The Miners' Federation of the United Kingdom passed a resolution in favor of a five-day week at their recent meeting. The proposal will be submitted to a ballot of the men in all the mines of the country.

According to the latest report compiled by the committee on welfare, more than 24,580 employees of the United States Steel corporation are stockholders of the company, their aggregate holdings amounting to more than 102,245 shares.

Scientific methods are to replace the old system of factory inspection in Illinois. In a recent civil service examination for factory inspectors, men specialized for different classes of inspection passed. For mechanical appliance inspectors mechanics alone qualified; for ventilation inspectors, experts on the subject secured the positions and for structural iron work and all the other classes, an expert in each trade was made an inspector.

Soldiers' Monument Unveiled.

Dover, N. H., Oct. 19.—A handsome monument presented to the city of Dover by Col. Daniel Hall in memory of the soldiers from this city and vicinity who fought in the civil war was unveiled today with simple but impressive ceremonies. Corporal James Tanner, former commissioner of Penitentiaries of the United States, delivered the principal address.

LOCAL WOMAN PRAISED.

Paper Read at Enterprise Institute Is Going to Historical Society

Teachers returning from Enterprise are much elated over the publicity that will be given a paper read by Mrs. F. S. Ivanhoe of this city before that body of teachers. The address will be published in the Oregon Teachers' Monthly and Prof. Shaffer of the University of Oregon will file a copy with the Oregon Historical Society. The paper was of a reminiscent sort dealing with the early development of teachers' institutes in Wallaw county. She pointed out that it was just 25 years ago since the first institute was held in Wallaw county and that the corps of instructors at that time numbered three: L. J. Ruch, then superintendent of Wallaw county and now deceased, Judge William Smith of Baker, but then a teacher at the settlement of Cove and the speaker, Mr. Smith was detained at home by illness in his family but his son and daughter were present to hear the paper and appreciate the tributes paid Mr. Smith. She drew a pleasing contrast between the sessions of a quarter of a century ago and the one at which she spoke. The teachers enjoyed every word of the beautifully constructed speech and Mrs. Ivanhoe has been roundly applauded verbally for her efforts.

Boat Goes on Rocks.

San Francisco, Oct. 19.—The steamer J. J. Loggie, went ashore in a fog early this morning near Point Arguello. Advance reports state it is a total loss. It is also reported that the steamer Camino is helpless at sea off Hecupa Heads, having lost her propeller. Tugs have been sent out to the relief of a vessel owned by Swayne Hoy, the San Franciscan losing her way. The Loggie drove heavily on the rocks and later broke in two. Capt. O. Svendsen and crew of 18 left the wreck in small boats and made their way ashore. One narrowly escaped drowning but revived. The Loggie is loaded to the full capacity of 400,000 feet of lumber and shingles.

Ready for Dry Farming Congress.

Lethbridge, Alta., Oct. 19.—Preparations for the entertainment of delegates and visitors to the seventh International Dry Farming Congress have been completed, and Lethbridge expects to entertain a record-breaking crowd next week. An elaborate exposition of dry farming products and of machinery used in dry farming work will be held in connection with the congress and is expected to attract many additional visitors.

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
