THE IMBLER-ALICEL FRUIT DISTRICT

Where the Grande Ronde Apples Grow—A Series of Articles Describing One of Eastern Oregon's Greatest Resources.

ARTICLE NO. 2.

Being charged with insanity by many neighbors Mr. Wilson went to his orchard without consultation. He planted the varieties of apples he thought would do well in this climate and then he took care of them. Heretofore when an orchard was planted it was of family size and the New York habit of letting the trees care for themselves was adopted.

But Mr. Wilson believed differently. He knew there was a scientific way to raise fruit and that Hood River and Yakima had no copyright on that plan. He studied conditions, analyzed his soil, studied pruning and spraying.

What was the result?

Wonderful growth of his trees the first year.

Some thought there would be no trees there the second year when Wilson planted them for they believed he would grow discouraged the first year and turn his land back to wheat. But when the first year's growth was registered on the trees old settlers could not believe their eyes.

"Yes, trees will grow all right, but they will never bear any to the amount of anything."

These were the cheerful words breathed in the ears of Mr. Wilson for some time. As the years went by and the one hundred acres showed fine growth and healthy condition this orchard began to attract attention of fruit men from elsewhere. The different colleges sent representatives here. The Sandridge soil was analyzed in every agricultural college west of Denver.

Wilson's idea was taking root. It was attracting the interest necessary to prove this was a fruit district or it was not. The decision went in Wilson's favor, regardless of the pioneer who still expected there never would be any fruit on the trees. Age of the trees brought the fruit, as is evidenced this year.

To visit the old Wilson orchard, which is now the property of the Thronsen Fruit company and is one of the best commercial orchards in the Northwest, is but to see a most magnificent exemplification of what industry and study in connection with Sandridge soil will produce.

The pioneer idea has been exploded. Wilson's orchard is raising fruit. But how could it be possible? Did not the man who had raised nothing but wheat for years know that trees require moisture and the Sandridge was generally admitted to be dry land with no chance of irrigation.

fore ever planting a tree he investigated the moisture end of the proposition. He found it on any summer day he would go upon his land and scrape the top soil away there was plenty of moisture underneath. And it was that even moisture that nature only provides through sub-irrigation. Even distribution and always the same. That was what won Wilson to the orchard idea for the Sandridge. He knew that with canals and running water he could not irrigate an orchard like nature would do it with her sub-irrigation. He knew also that fruit when irrigated by man does not receive the moisture in proportion that it does when nature attends to that important function.

Mr. Wilson had his orchard in fine shape. Many people were looking at it. Eastern visitors came and inspected it. Finally several prominent men in the financial world decided to

buy it. They associated themselves with George L. Cleaver, then a resident of La Grande, and the Thronsen Fruit company bought the Wilson orchards, paying a handsome price to the man who had faith and who had bucked every precedent and every bit of advice that was given him about the Sandridge. He knew it was successful because he had so proven. So he went a few miles east, bought some wheat land and set out one hundred and sixty acres to fruit and he is now developing that tract.

"WELFARE OF ANY ONE MAN IMMATERIAL"—ROOSEVELT

Colonel Declares the Progressive Fight Must Go Just the Same

PRINCIPLES ARE AT STAKE

ANOTHER DAY PASSES WITHOUT VARIATION IN CONDITION OF THE PATIENT—PHYSICIANS ARE OPTIMISTIC.

Chicago, Oct. 17.—Campaign activities should not cease because of Colonel Roosevelt's attempted assassination, so far as he is concerned.

The following statement was issued by Colonel Roosevelt today at Mercy hospital in answer to what Mr. Bryan said yesterday in his speech at Franklin, Ind.:

"I wish to express my cordial agreement with the manly and proper statement of Mr. Bryan at Franklin, Ind., when in arguing for a continuance of the discussion of the issues at stake in the contest he said 'The issues of this campaign should not be determined by the act of an assassin. Neither Colonel Roosevelt nor his friends could ask that the discussion be turned away from the principles that are involved. If he is elected president it should be because of what he has done in the past and what he proposes to do hereafter.'"

Roosevelt Demands Discussion.

"I wish to point out, however, that neither I nor my friends have asked that the discussion be turned away from the principles that are involved. On the contrary, we emphatically demand that the discussion be carried on precisely as if I had not been shot."

"I shall be sorry if Mr. Wilson does not keep on the stump and I feel that he owes it to himself and the American people to continue on the stump."
