Traveling direct from New York to the Pacific coast, Wm. A. Brady's production of George Broadhurst's play "Bought and Paid for" comes to us after a three week's engagement at the Cort theater in San Francisco, where it is breaking all records, and will be the attraction at the Steward Friday night.

As to the play itself, "Bought and Paid for" is in three acts, the scenes of which are laid in New York City at the present time. The story, briefly,

concerns the marriage of Virginia Blaine, a ten dollar a week telephone operator to Robert Stafford, millionaire and man about town, their subsequent separation as the result of the husband's over-indulgence in drink, and their final reunion through the power of love, and a little side aid from a scheming brother-in-law. Baker's Progress.

The Oregonian has the following item regarding the Y. M. C. A. building now being erected at Baker, Ore. Baker, Or., Oct. 21.—(Special)—Baker's new Y. M. C. A. building which has been under construction since last spring, was officially dedicated to the work that it will be used for in the laying of its corner stone this morning at 10 o'clock. The services were under the auspices of the grand lodge of Masons. Judge M. D. Clifford of this city, who was deputized as past grand master of the lodge by Grand Master Burnett of Salem officiated at the services.

Despite the inclement weather there was a good turnout of the members of the Masonic order and the people of the city. The ceremony was the usual ritualistic one of the order and impressed the spectators with the solemnity of the occasion.

State Senator McCulloch, of Baker, made a short but appropriate address on the movement in this city in securing the building, which will mean so much to the future of the community and the bettering of humanity. He said that in the beginning 75 young men had worked up a subscription of \$7500 which had ultimately grown into the present subscription of approximately \$30,000, and the realization of the building.

The music of the programme was furnished by the representatives of the several churches and by the Baker Concert band.

Ordinance No. 642, Series 1912.

An ordinance declaring the cost of improving the south side of Spring street extending 125.3 feet west from the west curb line of Sixth street and extending 111.3 feet east from the east sidewalk line of Sixth street, determining the property benefited hereby; levying an assessment thereon to defray the costs and expenses of the improvement; providing for the assessment roll of the same and directing the entry of said assessments in the docket of city liens; providing the time when the same shall become delinquent, and requiring the city recorder to prepare a special assessment roll in accordance with the assessments herein levied and to collect said assessments.

The city of La Grande does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the council has considered the proposed assessment of the property benefited by the improving of the south side of Spring street extending 125.3 feet west from the west curb line of Sixth street and extending 111.3 feet east from the east sidewalk line of Sixth street, and all objections made thereto, and hereby ascertains, determines and declares the whole cost of said improvement in the manner provided by resolution duly passed by the council on the 29th day of May 1912, to be the sum of \$159.70, and the property hereafter described is specially benefited by said improvement and the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot or parcel thereof or parcel of land within the assessment district and which is so specially benefited by

reason of said improvement and which has been equitably apportioned among all lots, parts of lots or land bounding, fronting on or contiguous to such improvement and within the district created for the purpose of making such improvement to the extent of the benefits to such lots, parts of lots or land, by reason of such improvement and in no case in excess of said benefits, and the amount set opposite the description or number of each lot or part thereof or parcel of land for which said respective parcel is assessed is as follows:

Chaplin's Addition

Laura L. Stultz, lot 1, block 98,

626.5 sq. ft. walk at 13 1/4c \$84.58

E. D. Stinecamp, lot 20, block

99, 556.5 sq. ft. walk at 13 1/4c 75.12

and the recorder of the city of La Grande is hereby directed to prepare a special assessment roll in accordance with the foregoing assessment and enter the said assessment in the docket of city liens.

Section 2. It is further provided that said assessment shall become due and payable immediately after the same is entered in the docket of city liens, and delinquent within ten days thereafter.

Section 3. When the recorder of the city of La Grande shall have completed the special assessment roll in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance he shall without delay, give at least five days' notice in one or more of the newspapers having a general circulation in said city of the time when such assessments may be paid in installments, provided each

therefor within ten days from the date of the first publication of said notice, said application to be made under and by virtue of the provisions of Chapter 5, Title 26, L. O. L. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the mayor and publishing in one is—
