THE IMBLER-ALICEL FRUIT DISTRICT

Where the Grande Ronde Apples Grow—A Series of Articles Describing One of Eastern Oregon's Greatest Resources.

ARTICLE NO. 5.

In driving through the Sandridge you will observe a neat little bungalow with a few posies planted around the porch. Looks like some lady who reads the Ladies' Home Journal lived there.

Not so, it is a bachelor's quarters. Two real, live, good natured bachelors spend their time there and they are happy with their fruit trees. It has been said they have them named but there is no proof of this statement.

D. W. Greene and G. L. Sawyer are the men who had confidence in the Grande Ronde fruit section and cast their lots in the little cottage on the Sandridge. Now, Hood River boasts of her university club; Yakima boasts of her professional men who own orchards and Medford claims to be the

place where Mrs. Potter Palmer and the idle rich invest their money in fruit land and care for it by proxy. But the Sandridge has it over all of these places, for Greene and Sawyer are graduates of Yale and Harvard, respectively. This information was not gained from them either, for they are among the best fellows in the world. They wear "ki ki" clothes, meet everyone who calls on the same common ground and they are as modest as school girls when a newspaper man is around.

But all of this counts for nothing when you come to know what they have been doing on their twenty acres. Most of it was planted when they bought it, but the care they have given that twenty acres has shown results. Not a tree is overlooked. As the horse owner grooms his favorite steed so Greene and Sawyer care for their trees.

This year the fruit yield on the twenty acres is enormous. The packers are busy putting away the crop, and to show the spirit of these two men, they turned over the cottage to the packers and they themselves sleep in the barn. Talk about hospitality on a Texas cattle ranch, well, make a trip out to "Hardscrabble" and you will encounter the pure article.

"Have you any regrets at spending your time in the Grande Ronde," was asked one of the two men.

"Any regrets? Well, I should say not," was the answer. "Do you know this is destined to be the fruit country of the whole northwest? We have studied conditions thoroughly since coming here and this locality has more points in its favor than any other section. As for the fruit business, here is the way we have figured it: Everything has its time of excitement and then everything must reach a solid, substantial basis. The fruit industry is now going through the nursing period in the northwest. It has been the victim of the Rufus Wallingfords in many instances who tried to job the investing public, and in some instances succeeded. But the wildcatting will soon be over and then the man who is raising good fruit in a legitimate and honorable way will be recognized. His product will bring a good, fair price which means that fruit land will bring in a revenue greater than any other kind of land. Then is when we are confident every inch of the Grande Ronde valley that will raise fruit will be transformed into a marvelous orchard. We are indeed well pleased with this valley. We like the people, and we are going to stay and continue to develop good fruit for we have confidence in the business."

These gentlemen came here three years ago and located after thorough investigation of every section of the northwest.

The Winter Banana Apple.
Struck with possibilities of the Winter Banana apple the Hardscrabble people have just finished planting quite an acreage to this special variety. It is a beautiful apple, waxy in appearance and has a delicious flavor. After looking up every detail regarding its production Mr. Greene and Mr. Sawyer have concluded it is a staple variety for this valley.

Allen Was Surprised.
While the writer was inspecting the Hardscrabble orchard R. W. Allen, superintendent of the state experimental station at Hermiston and a special representative of the fruit department of the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis came out.

He was thoroughly surprised at the district and completely carried away with the Hardscrabble orchard. "I am delighted more than I can tell to see the wonderful fruit development," he said. "Why don't this section advertise?"

And with that question Mr. Allen told the whole story of needed development in the fruit line in this valley.

Why don't the growers advertise?
There is just one thing necessary to make great commercial enterprises out of orchards besides growing the fruit—that is to let people over the world know that you grow it. But this is something that will come.

Oregon For Roosevelt

That Theodore Roosevelt will poll a heavy popular vote in Oregon at the November election, and that the total number of ballot cast in his favor may equal the combined strength of those for Taft and Wilson, is indicated by a poll just taken in representative precincts of Benton, Union, Yamhill, Multnomah, Douglass, Tillamook and Lincoln counties. This poll shows him far in the lead of his rivals.

The total figures on this straw vote are: Roosevelt 1,483; Wilson 1,037; Taft 897; Debs 319 and Chafin 183. Aside from these figures over 300 electors who were approached refused to state their preference for president, but these will probably vote in the same proportion as above.

National Prohibition Platform

We favor:

1. —Suffrage for women on the same terms as for men.
2. A uniform marriage and divorce law. The extermination of polygamy and the complete suppression of the traffic in girls.
3. Absolute protection of the rights of labor without impairment of the rights of capital.
4. The settlement of all international disputes by arbitration.
5. The abolition of child labor in mines, work shops and factories, with the rigid enforcement of the laws now flagrantly violated.
6. The election of United States senators by direct vote of the people.
7. A presidential term of six years and one term only.
8. Court review of postoffice and other departmental decisions and orders; the extension of the postal savings bank system and of rural delivery, and the establishment of an efficient parcels post.
9. The initiative, referendum and recall.
10. As the tariff is a commercial question it should be fixed on the scientific basis of accurate knowledge secured by means of a permanent, omni-partisan tariff commission, with ample powers.
11. Equitable graduated income and inheritance taxes.
12. Conservation of our forest and mineral reserves, and the reclamation of waste lands. All mineral and timber lands, and water powers, now owned by the government, should be held perpetually and leased for revenue purposes.
13. Clearly defined laws for the regulation and control of corporations transacting an interstate business.
14. Efficiency and economy in governmental administration.
15. The protection in one day in seven as a day of rest.
