

BAKER GAME IS DRAWING NEAR

FRIENDLY BUT SPIRITED GAME OF 1911 VIVID.

Both Teams Have Already Suffered One Defeat Each.

With the Pendleton-La Grande game the game of all games in La Grande this year, interest is keen in the coming event but there is also

another scheduled interscholastic athletic contest that is looked forward to with concern in this city and that is the contest with Baker high at Baker. The fans remember vividly the 6-0 score here last year, when both teams exhibited rare ability and clever football. Baker got a stiff trouncing at Boise—La Grande got one from Walla, but it is doubtful if either of the teams will lose again until they meet on the Baker grounds. What will happen then is like a world series, problematical, but La Grande and Baker play with a little more vim, a little more ginger and determination, against each other than either does against any other team. Several hundred students will likely go to Baker on that day.

Bakerites Hopeful.
Baker, Oct. 26—(Special).—Although Boise wiped the earth with Baker

high, the proteges of Coach Nichols are rounding into fine form and expect to win the championship of Eastern Oregon. The line has been strengthened and they are perfecting the forward pass and other ground gaining plays. Jim Nichols has turned out many winning teams and the boys believe he will have a winning aggregation this year.

Yale, Harvard, Princeton and Dartmouth are the four Eastern schools that are in line for the big championship. That is, they were before the games were played off this afternoon.

One thing is certain: La Grande has an exceptionally fast gridiron. The checkerboard takes up the straightaway of the race track and is as fast as turf, in dry season, but would muddy up readily.

WEIGHT NOW A BIG ASSET

Upon the caliber of the line is going to depend the failure or success of the football team this fall. There is no other part of the eleven which is going to have to stand the brunt of the game as much as will the forwards, and unless they are of the highest class there is not much chance for a winning aggregation.

The linemen this season must not only be heavy, but they must be fast enough to charge into plays and break them up before they are fairly started. Once let a play get under way, and there is no opportunity to prevent the man with the ball making the required two and one-half yards necessary to the down under the new ruling. It can be plainly understood that a team stands little chance of protecting its goal under the four down rule, unless it has a forward defense capable of accomplishing more than has ever been required of it.

The line is going to be a particularly difficult problem. It is necessary more than in recent years to teach the men to charge fast and hard, and if they are not able to do that, then there is little chance that they will stop the

rushes to be directed toward them. Not only must the forwards be able to charge with more speed and strength than has been the case in recent years, but they must also be heavier than previously. There is no the least doubt in the world that the majority of the attacks is going to be directed toward the line, and unless the men in it are powerful enough to plow through and get the man with the ball before he is fairly started they are not likely to stop him at all until after he has gone his distance.

That is not saying, though, that the line attack will be the same as under the old rulings. Then it was a constant battle, with weight as the most decisive factor in the backs; now it will be, instead of the attempt to maul down the opposing forwards, quick dashes for slight openings by fast and artful backs who are good broken field runners. Every back field under the present conditions must contain a heavy line plunger but the men who will do the majority of the gaining are those who need but the slightest opening through which to slip for a gain of four or five yards before being downed by the secondary defense.

The football team this season which is to attain the greatest amount of success will be the one which will have a line of heavy, fast chargers and a back field which will contain a heavy quarter-back, two halfbacks who are best in an open field and a heavy plunging fullback.
