ORDINANCE NO. 641, SERIES 1912.

An ordinance declaring the cost of installing a sewer in section No. 2 sewer district No. 2, of the city of La Grande, Oregon, determining the property benefited thereby; levying an assessment thereon to defray the costs and expenses of the improvement; providing for the assessment roll of the same and directing the entry of said assessment in the docket of city liens; providing a time when the same shall become delinquent and requiring the city recorder to prepare a special assessment roll in accordance with the assessment herein levied and to collect said assessment. The city of La Grande does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the council has considered the proposed assessment of the property herein benefited by the installation of a sewer in section No. 2 of sewer district No. 2 in the city of La Grande, Oregon, and all objections made thereto, and hereby ascertains, determines and declares the whole costs of said improvement in the manner provided by the resolution duly passed by the council on the 21st day of March 1912, to be the sum of \$1644.98, and the property hereinafter described is specially benefited by said improvement and the special and peculiar benefits accruing to each lot and parcel thereof or parcel of land within the assessment district and which is so specially benefited by reason of said improvement and which has been equitably apportioned among all blocks, lots, parts of blocks and lots, lands and real estate bounding, abutting, contiguous, fronting and adjacent and tributary to such improvement and within the district created for the purpose of making said improvement to the extent of the benefits to such lots, parts of lots, land and real estate by reason of the improvement and in no case in excess of said benefits, and the amount set opposite the description or number of each lot or part thereof, or parcel of land for which said respective parcels is assessed is as follows:

SCHOOL MEASURE DESERVES ATTENTION.

Consolidation of Regents, and No Duplication is Aim.

La Grande Ore., Oct. 29.—To the Editor—There is one bill which will appear on the official ballot to be voted on Nov. 5th which deserves more attention than it has been receiving. I refer to the bill to place the University of Oregon and the State Agricultural College under one board of regents, to prevent duplication of studies as much as possible, and to lower the expense of running the two institutions. This bill was drafted under direction of Governor West, State School Superintendent Alderman and prominent representatives of both institutions, and is intended to promote the efficiency of both and to lower the general expense of the taxpayers of the state.

It is endorsed by the state grange, the state federation of labor, the Portland Taxpayers League and many other organizations. The greatest benefit from this bill will be to take these educational institutions out of politics, making their interests harmonious, and prevent envy and jealousy between the schools. It ought to pass, and I hope that our people will vote 320x "Yes".
