vertising to begin with and has not until the last year produced enough apples to attract the commission men who contract in train load lots. Rest assured the quality of the apples raised here will find a market at a good price.

Who buys orchard tracts on the Sandridge?

Doubtful if many La Grande people have an idea of the prominent people from the east whose names appear as owners or part owners in Essau lands. There are railroad presidents, ministers of the gospel, bankers and brokers, merchants and wholesalers interested in this section. And they all got in on the same price—\$450 an acre—for that is the one price district. Local people pay it, Colorado people pay it and New York people pay it. But they pay it gladly after looking over other orchard sections, and after they acquire orchard land in the Imbler-Alicel district they hold it.

One of the best recommendations for this section is the class of men who are engaged in the commercial orchard business.

Frank Bridges, a man who has traveled throughout the country, has seen every fruit district in America and knows land values very well, has entered the business to stay. When he first associated himself with Geo. L. Cleaver, which business association was by mutual consent severed some time since, he little expected to follow it for it was out of his line. But he saw the possibilities; experienced the satisfaction of developing

something that was good, and being able to sell his tracts at half what other districts were asking he placed on the market a number of acres.

Those who purchased were pleased and are still pleased. He developed another large tract and sold it. The demand for honest orchard investment was so great that as soon as this tract was sold he bought one of the finest pieces of land in the whole valley and has planted it to the celebrated "Delicious" apple interspersed with Winter Banana and Rome Beauty. Between the trees he has alfalfa growing and it presents a beautiful appearance.

The land lies one and a half miles from Alicel near the splendid orchard developed by the La Grande Investment company. It is one half mile from the school. The trees are now two years old and they show an unusual growth and healthy appearance. Water is to be had

at a depth of but a few feet and the soil is moist the year round. The E. O. L. & P. power line passes the land, the railroad is within a half mile and the new electric line survey is but a short distance away. Mr. Bridges has laid the land off in attractive plots, running private roads through each way which will give every one who settles there a road frontage.

The Delicious apple, which he has planted, carries one of the strongest recommendations for growth in this climate of any of the varieties. This year J. B. Weaver of Union, a grower of Delicious apples, is selling extra fancy at \$2.50 a box. Several trees are bearing here and the fruit commands the top prices.
