## WRONG MAN PROMPTS PLAY

"SWEAT" ENDS IN "CONFESSION"  
BY SUSPECT.

Audience Fights With Heroine Dur-  
ing Titanic Struggle.

Charles Klein was prompted to write "The Third Degree" after reading of the execution of the wrong man for the crime, to which he confesses after being subjected to a fourteen hour examination by the police. Several years after the execution, the guilty party confessed and died in prison. Mr. Klein, when he read the details, became so wrought up that he forthwith arranged with Henry B.
