TURKS SUFFER TWO SEVEREST BLOWS OF WAR

LULE BURGAS AND ADRIANOPE TAKEN IS REPORT

AIRMAN KILLED BY THE TURKS WITH SHRAPNEL

End of Ottoman Rule in Europe Is Foreseen If Adrianople Has Really Fallen as Reported—Severe Turkish Reverses Are Reported From Various Points Through Balkans.

AIR SCOUT KILLED.

Paris, Oct. 31.—While reconnoitering in the air over Adrianople, Aviator Popoff, a Russian, was killed by the Turks today. He is the first aviator to die in actual warfare, according to advices. Mass firing was first tried and then shrapnel was resorted to, it bringing Popoff down. This shatters the theory that airmen are practically unhittable.

London, Oct. 31.—Adrianople surrendered to the allies following a general Bulgarian assault, according to a dispatch from Sofia today. The report is not confirmed. Constantinople dispatches state the Erkene River battle is still raging. Turks having the advantage on the Eastern extremity. There is a hundred-mile battle front and the losses are enormous.

Austrians Seek Division.

Vienna, Oct. 31.—Diplomatic negotiations with Serbia are reported to have been started today by the Austrian government regarding a division of Turkish territory, should the allies win the war.

Turkish Troops Routed.

Sofia, Oct. 31.—It was officially announced here today that the Turks were completely routed at Lule Burgas, and are now fleeing with the Bulgarians in hot pursuit. The war office estimates the retreating Turks number 200,000.

Ottoman Rule Wanes.

Vienna, Oct. 31.—The end of the Ottoman rule in Europe is the prediction of diplomats following the reports of the Turkish disaster at Lule Burgas. The belief is expressed that the Bulgars will be in Constantinople inside of a week. It is expected that Nasim Pasha will rally his troops for another stand at a point 40 miles west of Constantinople. Rumors that Adrianople has fallen are generally credited.

NATION MOURNS LOSS OF SMILING VICE EXECUTIVE

Demise Occurred Last Night and Funeral Services Are Set for Saturday In Utica.

New York, Oct. 31.—Senator Borah of Idaho is reported to be a possible substitute for the late Mr. Sherman as Republican vice presidential candidate. Hadley of Missouri, Cummins of Iowa are other rumored possibilities. Speculation is rife among politicians, but the attitude of the men mentioned is unknown.

Utica, N. Y., Oct. 31.—Flags are at half mast, and nearly every home in Utica is draped this morning on account of the death of Vice President Sherman. The funeral service will probably be held in the Dutch Reformed church where the deceased attended. It is expected that the president and scores of congressmen will attend. Hundreds of telegrams and messages are pouring in on the members of the family. President Taft, Governor Wilson and Colonel Roosevelt have sent messages. Mrs. Sherman is prostrated.

New York, Oct. 31.—Charles D. Hilles, chairman of the Republican national committee, has called a meeting of the committee for Chicago on November 12 to select a successor to Sherman on the Republican ticket. The death of Sherman does not affect the validity of Taft-Sherman electors.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 31.—The nation's capital is in deep mourning today over the death of Vice President Sherman. Flags on all government buildings are at half mast. Genuine sorrow is expressed on all sides over the death of "Sunny Jim," as he was generally termed here. The funeral of Sherman will take place at two o'clock Saturday afternoon. All arrangements for the obsequies have been completed at Utica. Rev. M. W. Strycker, president of Hamilton college, will officiate. The body will lie in state in the Onondaga court house tomorrow afternoon.

Mrs. Sherman is in poor health and it was feared the shock of her husband's death would aggravate her condition but it was reported she is improved this morning. All army posts and naval vessels were ordered to lower their flags to half mast. Senator Bacon, president pro tem of the senate, today authorized Sergeant at Arms Randall to arrange for the attendance of senators at the funeral. Speaker Clark has telegraphed the house sergeant at arms, and he has appointed a committee of the house members to attend the obsequies.

Funeral services will be held from the First Presbyterian church. Rev. Louis Holden assisting Rev. Stryker. Employees of the Utica Trust & Deposit company, of which Sherman was president, will be active pall bearers. Sherman personally selected the honorary pall bearers a month ago, and locked the list of names in his desk.

Kansas City, Oct. 31.—When asked here today whether he would accept the Republican vice presidential nomination, Governor Hadley of Missouri was non-committal. "I would rather not answer now," he declared. "The national committee will decide November 12."

GRANGE ROAD BILLS URGED

C. D. HUFFMAN POINTS WAY FOR VOTERS.

"No. 326 provides for the creation of a state highway department, etc. The object of these grange bills is to encourage and promote the construction of good permanent roads, radiating from market centers out and into the rural communities, and such other roads as the business interests of the county may require. Wisdom Seeker Comes To City

LONG JOURNEY AFTER LEARNING IS MADE.

SHEEPSKIN HIS PRIDE

Chinese Boy of 19 Comes From Far Off China to Study Here.

From a mission school in Hong Kong, across the Pacific to the new halting place of civilization, four years of diligent study in recitation rooms and laboratories of the La Grande high school, then back across the Pacific to the confines of the Chinese empire to spend the remainder of his life in pursuit of his own happiness and the betterment of his race, was, is and will be the career of Wong Ying Ho, a Chinese boy with 18 or 19 celestial years upon his well developed brow, who is now a studious seeker after learning in this city. He will devote four years to the completion of the academic and manual training work of the local school, then go back to his native home and there radiate the new customs and dogmas of the western world among his fellows who may hanker after but can't reach, the elements of civilization that have made old China a new China; have driven out forever the dragon and his superstitious rites, supplementing with the things looking forward toward something newer and more occidental. Wong Ying Ho came to La Grande from Hong Kong, and is a guest with his uncle, Wong Yet, a local merchant who succeeded the late Hung Tuck. His father is now a grocery man in China; he made his stake in Des Moines, Ia., in 10 years and then recrossed the Atlantic, satisfied that his sons must obtain a thorough Western education. He sent Ho to St. Stephens' college in Hong Kong, where the lad mastered rudiments of the American language. He carries his certificate from that mission school with a great deal of silent pride. He is lethargic about speaking of it. He warms up with acquaintance and can tell of his future plans and past life with a good deal of vividness, once he is started with a little cross examination. He is a diligent pupil, his teachers say, and he will go through his four year course here with something better as his goal than a mere diploma—he is going to take his occidental wisdom to the Orient and there use it to his own and his neighbor's advantage. He is bashful. But he will get over that. He is a Chinaman; yet he has ideals, which is something all Chinamen don't claim and something that all white men can't prove they have. Right now he is hampered with an unglub tongue and bashfulness, but they won't last long.

DISORDER AT CUBAN POLLS, FEAR LEADERS

ELECTION TOMORROW IS CENTER OF ISLAND-WIDE STUDY

PRESENT VICE PRESIDENT CANDIDATE FOR EXECUTIVE

Generally Believed Tendencies Are Toward Less Outbreaks of Disorder at Elections Than Usual but Trouble Is Believed Certain—Losers Haven't Learned Game Yet.

Havana, Oct. 31.—All Cuba is waiting in suspense the outcome of the great political battle to be fought out at the polls tomorrow. Never in the history of the island republic have the issues at stake in a campaign for presidency been so momentous and never before has the feeling between the opposing parties been so high.

The election tomorrow will be the second to be held by Cubans without American supervision. The first election, that of 1905, when Estrada Palma was elected president for a second term, was accompanied by disorders, following by threats of revolution, culminating in the outbreak of August, 1906, directed by Dr. Alfredo Zayas and Gen. Pino Guerra and precipitated the second American intervention. The next election was held in 1908, under American supervision, and resulted in the choice of Gen. Jose Miguel Gomez as president and Dr. Zayas as vice president. The election was marked by the absence of any disorders.

The question now uppermost in the minds of all persons having the welfare of Cuba at heart is whether or not the republic can hold an honest and orderly election for the presidency with a loyal submission of the defeated party to the will of the majority. Many view the future with grave forebodings, but the more conservative of all of the rival parties and political factions express the belief that the republic will satisfactorily solve her own problems and that there will be no occasion for outside intervention.

The candidate of the Liberal party for the presidency is Dr. Alfredo Zayas, the present vice president. The standard-bearer of the Conservative party is Gen. Mario Menocal. Both are able men and each has a large following. Dr. Zayas is a journalist by profession and is well known as an orator. Dr. Menocal is an engineer and distinguished himself as a military leader in the war for independence. Four years ago he was an unsuccessful candidate for president in opposition to Gen. Gomez. For several years past he has acted as manager of one of the largest sugar plantations of Cuba.

The Liberal party candidate for vice president is Rafael Manduley, governor of Oriente province. The candidate of the Conservative party
