## NEW CAPITAL INVESTS HERE

ILLINOIS OF WEALTH COM-  
LA GRANDE.  
Blue Mountain Creamery Stock  
Changes Hands—New Officers.

Extensive reorganization that adds capital and new faces to the list of stockholders and officials of the Blue Mountain Creamery company has been effected during the past few days. The principal change is that George C. Hopkins, a man of 15 years experience in creamery work, comes to La Grande from Oregon, Illinois to assume the management of the new company.

L. R. Snook, at present county recorder, enters into the company and has been elected secretary and treasurer and henceforth will have immediate charge of the books and accounts. J. W. Bush, the veteran butter maker and creamery man relinquishes his office as manager and takes that of president, intending to devote a portion of his time to real estate interests and his dairy at Cove. E. D. Selder, the local confectionary, is the other individual who has become a part of the company and, in addition to these men, various others have taken over stock in the concern, a portion of which amount was made purchasable when F. H. Green retired to move on his homestead a few weeks ago.

The new manager comes from Illinois exceptionally well recommended with a long career of successful creamery work behind him. He and a brother recently disposed of a string of 15 creameries in the Illinois section of the country, and with a fortune of no mean proportions, started west to find a suitable location. He visited Walla Walla and then came to La Grande. Investigation soon convinced him that this was his much-sought spot to settle in and he immediately started for his home state to clean up business relations preparatory to moving his family to Oregon. He has been one of the substantial influential citizens of his state for many years.

Mr. Snook will take possession of his new duties as soon as he can obtain permission to resign his present post, a post that would automatically go from him early in January by reason of the general election next Tuesday. Mr. Selder may not affiliate himself actively with the concern for some few weeks but aims to eventually take that step, disposing of his confectionary store in the interim.

Mr. Bush, the retiring manager, said today he will remain in close touch with the creamery spending only enough time away from its affairs to look after his own ranching business. ## DISORDER

for second place is Enrique Jose Varona, a philosophical writer, former editor and at present a professor of the National University of Havana.

Unprejudiced observers of the situation appear inclined to the belief that Gen. Menocal will carry the election, though the following of Vice President Zayas is still strong. The chances of Gen. Menocal have been considerably augmented by his recent alliance with the wing of the Liberal party under the leadership of Gen. Ernesto Asbert. The latter was himself a candidate for the presidency, but withdrew from the contest in favor of Gen. Menocal. Gen. Asbert is vastly popular with the masses, having risen by his own efforts from a very humble position in life to the high post he now occupies as governor of Havana province.

Both Conservatives and Liberals are making strong bids for the large negro vote, the former trying to excite the animosity of the negroes against the Liberals on account of fatalities to men of their race during the last insurrection in Oriente, and the latter seeking to placate them by promises of unconditional pardon to thousands of negro prisoners now confined in jail throughout the island.

Besides the president and the vice president, there are to be elected tomorrow 13 of the 24 senators, 49 of the 95 representatives who compose the lower house, the governors of the six provinces into which the island is divided, and mayors, councilmen and minor officials in 95 municipalities.

During the closing days of the campaign the opposing parties have reached such a stage of rivalry that street fights and incipient riots have

been frequent. Today the cooler heads on both sides are counselling moderation, and the unusual precautions taken by the authorities in Havana and elsewhere to prevent disorder at the polls tomorrow have met with general approval. Both parties realize that recourse to arms in the settlement of election difficulties will almost inevitably precipitate American intervention, but grave fears are felt over the outcome of the election nevertheless. In the present state of the public mind it appears to be likely that many on both sides would as soon face another intervention as to submit to the rule of the opposition.

### SCOTCHMAN MEETS DEATH.

Accident Results in Death From Loss of Blood.

James Ord, a Scotchman, died last night in this city after several hours of excruciating pain and great loss of blood, resulting from an accident at the Palmer lumber camps yesterday morning. He was brought to La Grande on the first train but the loss of blood was so great that there was little hope for him when he reached the operating table. One leg was amputated above the knee, and the other leg had suffered a Potts fracture. Death ensued a few hours after he reached the city.

A mother survives him, she residing in Scotland, and the deceased has a sister in Detroit, Michigan, it is believed, but aside from these two relatives none other are known.

### Murder Suspects Arrested.

Lima, O., Oct. 31.—Charles Conway and wife, suspected of complicity in the murder of Sophia Singer, the heiress at Chicago were arrested today at the home of Conway's mother, Mrs. Joseph Cramer. Conway and his wife expressed surprise when informed that Miss Singer had been murdered. The woman became hysterical when told that she and her husband were suspected of the crime.
