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PRINCIPALS FOR 'THIRD DEGREE' REACH CITY FOR ONE SHOW

When Charles Klein wrote "The Third Degree," which will be presented at the Steward tonight, he proved himself a better prophet than he himself believes. For, by reason of the recent police scandal which has arisen in New York and stirred the entire country Mr. Klein's great drama appears in an entirely new light. Throughout the entire action there is an undercurrent of suggestion of blackmail methods used by the police of New York City. When the piece was produced, it is doubtful if this attracted much attention. It was probably accepted as necessary only to the development of the plot and was taken as the vagaries of the playwright.

Since the revelations of the District Attorney Whitman, however, they present a much different appearance. The idea which Mr. Klein is thus attempting to impress upon his audiences reaches its climax in the third act when Richard Brew-

ster attorney for Howard Jeffries, Jr., accused of murder and forced into making a confession through the use of "third degree" methods, tells Capt. Clinton, the police officer who obtained the confession. "Yes, and the papers will be interested in knowing that you have become a millionaire on a salary of \$3000 a year."

This prophecy of the case of Lieut. Charles Becker is so startling that it is with difficulty that one remembers that Mr. Klein wrote his play before the New York tragedy.

The company which the United Play company has selected for the interpretation of "The Third Degree" is considerably above the average. Miss Gertrude Ritchie who takes the part of Annie, has a voice that is peculiarly adapted for the part she interprets, and her many mannerisms lend reality to the character. Miss Ritchie is ably assisted by Orrin T. Burke, in the role of Richard Brew-

ity of the voters in that county, and the people have the right to name the amount of bonds to be issued, providing the issue does not exceed 5 per cent.

We also believe that each of the two convict labor bills, providing for working all convicts upon public highways should become a law.

The Medford Home Rule County Bonding act is crudely drawn and places no protection around the expenditure of the money, neither does it give the people any initiative power toward naming the roads to be improved, and it offers no protection either to its citizens or the purchaser of the bonds, in leaving its power to issue more bonds entirely unlimited.

We believe that the necessity of making a start, and the danger of so many road measures defeating the whole proposition for getting better roads for Oregon, that considering all conditions as we see them it is wise to give our undivided support to the two Grange Roads bills No. 324 and No. 326, and the two Convict Labor bills No. 336 and 338 and vote "NO" upon each of the other three road bills and the two constitutional amendments pertaining to road bonding.

It is just as important to vote against the five conflicting bills:

No. 341—Harmony Committee bill, providing for a state highway board and one million state bond issue annually.

No. 343—Harmony Committee Constitutional Amendment providing for limitation of state bonds.

No. 345—Harmony Committee bonding act providing no safeguards around the people's money, nor giving them any power in selecting the road to be improved.

No. 347—Harmony Committee Constitutional amendment limiting county bonding which will cripple the effectiveness of the Grange County Bonding act.

No. 367—The Medford Home Rule County Bonding act which is poorly drawn and provides no safeguards, and ignores the people's will. All of these last five named bills should be defeated, and we appeal to those interested in securing better roads for Oregon to assist.

Finally, it is much better to have the Grange Road bills than nothing. As we see it there is no possible chance for any other road legislation at this time. Will you assist in this road work and help us make a greater Oregon?
